AMERICAN SECTION American Chamber of Commerce for the Levant

The recent institution at New York City of the American Section, Inc., of the American Chamber of Commerce for the Levant completes the circle of voluntary organized cooperation to push American-Levant business relations. There is large room on both sides of Atlantic for development of the Chamber and its activities but the foundation of work is well laid, and the character of the men and business houses back of the Chamber assure its future and that of American-Levant relations.

From the first, with the inauguration in the Near East of the American Chamber of Commerce for the Levant in 1911, the Honorary President, Hon. G. Bie Ravndal, Consul General at Constantinople, has held before the Chamber the ideal of a Levant House at New York City, and this has become a definite goal of the Chamber. "This 'Levant House' in America would act as a center and clearing house for all sorts of relations between the United States and the Near East. It would afford opportunities and facilities for social intercourse and for conferences and meetings of any sort affecting the two sections whether philanthropic or educational or commercial or maritime. In it the Chamber's American office and intelligence bureau would be established; the Levant House would be the fully developed Chamber."

Our former ambassadors, Hon. Oscar S. Straus, Hon. Henry Morgenthau, and Hon. Abram I. Elkus have definitively espoused the cause of the Chamber; the late Consular Inspector Gottschalk actively promoted the organization; the High Commissioner of the United States in the Near East, Rear Admiral Mark L. Bristol, has given the Chamber the support of unqualified Americanism; Mr. Oscar Gunkel, the dean-president, and the large body of loyal members have kept the chamber in vigorous life.

The Great War interrupted the encouraging growth but in 1919 the Chamber in the Levant started again its activities, and has expanded and has seen the most encouraging development of American-Levant trade relations despite the peculiar restrictions of

prolonged Armistice days.

Mr. Eliot G. Mears, Honorary Vice President of the Chamber, former U. S. Trade Commissioner in the Levant, returned to the United States in May, 1920, and began in America an active campaign for increased interest in the Levant. Mr. Mandil, Treasurer of the Board, followed in June and made a special appeal for a definite arrangement for organized cooperation with the Chamber in the Levant; Mr. Ravndal returned to the States in September on a furlough and was able to formulate plans with the assistance of Mr. Mears and Mr. Pratt for crystalizing the interest that had been aroused.

At a meeting of American members of the American Chamber of Commerce for the Levant held at the Merchants' Association on December 10th, a committee was authorized to undertake the work of organization of the American Section of the American Chamber of Commerce for the Levant. Dr. E. E. Pratt, as chairman, and Mr. A. W. Staub and Mr. Donald Frothingham were elected members of the Committee on organization, and with their energetic action plans matured rapidly.

On February 21, the Articles of Incorporation of the American Section were approved by the Supreme Court of the State of New York; on March 2d the incorporation papers were filed by the Secretary of State of New York.

The objects of the organization as stated in the articles of incorporation are: (1) To promote trade, commerce and business relations between the United States and the Near East; (2) to maintain a common meeting place for those interested in trade and commerce between the United States and the Near East; (3) to maintain a depot for the receipt and distribution of information relative to business in the Near East; (4) to guide and crystalize business opinion with reference to commercial matters in the Near East which affect the interests of the United States; (5) to create a mechanism ready at all times to take proper action with reference to matters affecting the commercial interests of the United States in the Near East.



the United States in such centers as Philadelphia, Boston, Baltimore, New Orleans, St. Louis, Chicago, Detroit, &c., just as in the Levant we want Sections or Associate Chambers at Aleppo, Batum, Bucharest, Sofia, Saloniki, Smyrna, Athens, Alexandria, Jerusalem, Beirut, etc.; the plan for the Levant has been feasible in the past and it is hoped that it will be more fully developed in the future. The local autonomy of such Sections would give perfect freedom in cooperative effort to attract the greatest possible amount of American and Levant interest to American-Levant relations.

The two corporate bodies in the Levant and America, respectively, are practically one and the same, and are only organized as two corporations in order to give each perfectly free and autonomous action. It is believed that more good can be accomplished for the development of American trade in the Near East by definitely organized cooperative effort, and Levant trade affairs will have backing on both sides of the Sea.

Membership in the American organization is limited to American firms, and membership in the Levant organization is limited to firms in the Near East. Membership in either organization, however, constitutes full and complete membership in the other.

The plank of the Chamber that there should be a New York office has been redeemed. Another clause in the program that there should be a monthly Trade Review has also been realized during the past year and a half. The Levant Trade Review will continue in the field as the organ of the Chamber, but its publication will, of course, not forbid the issuance of Bulletins by the American Section. One of the principal improvements to be effected immediately, if possible, is suggested in Mr. Ravndal's address at the last annual meeting of the Chamber at Constantinople: "— We have wanted closer relations between the East and the West, and to that end the foundation in New York of an Associate Chamber, and between the two head-quarters, forth and back across the ocean, frequent exchanges by cable of information regarding market conditions and trade affairs".

The American Section has already a group of staunch men of enterprise for its officers and directors. The Levant organization is vitally interested in making support of Levant-American relations worth while. Under the inspiring leadership of Charles Evans Hughes, Secretary of State, and Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, let all members of the Chamber, East and West, work for commercial and economic reconstruction and let there be teamwork, — concerted action intelligently directed.

Chamber of Commerce Convention at Atlantic City, U. S. America

The ninth annual convention of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America will be held at Atlantic City April 27 to 29. With the invitations and program of topics has been sent a folder concerning the conveniences of the convention city and the attractions that make Atlantic City the "World premier pleasure and health resort".

The program committee has announced as the theme of the convention: "In the public interest—more business methods in Government management, less Government management of business".

All of the questions to be brought before the sessions will be approached as they relate to the general subject. Speakers will include Government officials and leading business men in many lines of finance, commerce and industry.

Much of the work of the convention will be done as heretofore in group sessions.

There are eleven groups representing the major divisions of business; Government and Business, Railroads, Shipping, Natural Resources, Insurance, Foreign Commerce, Finance, Production in Industry, Distribution, Education, Organisation Activities in Relation to Government. These groups will take up first problems peculiar to the industries or interests within the group, and second, major problems common to all business, which will include the question of the tariff and that of taxation.

The program for the meeting marks a new departure for the National Chamber, in that groups will discuss questions of a more general nature than those affecting specific industries.

Distribution will discuss current price declines and their effects; constructive means for better marketing by produce exchanges and boards of trade and methods of merchandising.

Treatment of wages, contract cancellations, better accounting methods and the need of national statistics on production will be taken up by the group representing fabricated production. The finance group will have before it matters connected with the Government's fiscal policy, taxation, including the proposed turnover tax, reorganisation of Government operations and the question of the Government's future policy with respect to rediscount rates.

The group on foreign commerce will discuss foreign trade matters, including in its program such subjects as these—the work of national foreign trade conventions, trade bodies, the work of chambers of commerce, banks, railroads, express companies and clubs.

In line with the emphasis on foreign trade, which the War and Armistice days have occasioned, the Chamber will present at the convention the proposal that a separate bureau or department of Foreign Commerce be established by the Federal Government.

The Chamber of Commerce has recently added an eighth department to its service, that of natural resources production, with W.D. Brookings, formerly a lumber manufacturer of California as manager.

The corelation of production with foreign trade has begun to win the appreciation of American business; and it may be expected that the American business men will handle this essential doctrine with such sound sense, thoroughness, system and energy as will bring all so-called foreign fields speedily within the developed consciousness of American business.

Message from the Secretary of Commerce

In his first conference with the newspaper men at Washington, D. C., Herbert C. Hoover declared that it was the intention of the Department of Commerce to carry out plans for the most effective service of the business and manufacturing interests of the country, with larger attention also to the corelation of industries with foreign commerce. In speaking of general reorganization Mr. Hoover stated:

"The Department of Commerce should be in the widest sense a department of service to the commerce and industry of the country. It is not a department for the regulation of trade and industry. In order to do service to the greatest advantage I wish to establish a wider and better organized co-operation with the trade and commercial associations, and will in a short time present some plans to this end. I want to see our efforts to push our foreign commerce more closely related to our industries. This sort of enlarged activity is within the original purpose of the Department, and requires neither legislation nor burden upon taxpayers. This is no time to ask for appropriations to undertake new work. It is the time to search for economy and reorganization, for effective expenditure on essentials, the reduction of less essentials, and the elimination of duplication.

"If I were outlining one of the most essential directions for expansion of governmental activity, it would be in the constructive study and ventilation of the whole gamut of these possible improvements and of elimination of our great wastes in labor, in material, in power and a host of other directions".

Water Power in Greece.

(Consul General W. L. Lownie.)

A Swiss engineer has been employed by the Greek Government to investigate the water power in the state of Macedonia, and he has made an interesting report on the subject after a study of the falls of the rivers of Kladovo, Vodena, Niaoussa, lower Aliakmon, and high Aliakmon. Special tables have been prepared showing the estimated power of the falls of Bladovo to be 17,500 horsepower; those of Edessis, 26,000 horse. power; of Niaoussa, 22,000 horsepower; those of lower Aliakmon, 143,000 horse-power; and those of high Aliakmon as 143,000 herse-power. The total of available force of water from these falls is estimated at about 350,000 horse-power. It is estimated that the exploitation of the falls mentioned above will produce annually an electric current of about 120,000,000 kilowatts. The production of electric current from the falls of western Macedonia would be sufficient not only for the molive power and lighting of the three cities of Athens, Piræus, and Saloniki, but also for the motive power of the Larissa Railway.

The consumption of electric power at Athens and Piræus is about 40, 000,000 kilowatts annually and at Saloniki 9,000,000 kilowatts. The plants for the development of the waterfalls would cost approximately between 160,000,000 and 180,000,000 drs. (\$30,880,000 to \$34,740,000). On the basis of this expenditure, a kilo-

watt would cost from 12 to 13 lepta (2 to 2½ cents). As Greece is dependent upon the importation of coal for a large part of its fuel supply, the employment of its water power is of vital importance in the development of the national industries.

Turkey's Crisis

The New York Journal of Commerce reports an interview on the economic situation in Turkey accorded to its representative by Sigmund Metz on his return to the United States from Constantinople, where as manager he organized the branch of the Guaranty Trust Company.

Mr. Metz spoke of the critical condition of the finances of the Turkish Government and stated that the political crisis still rendered it incapable of meeting the present excessive burdens with adequate resources. The municipality of Constantinople also found itself curtailed from proper attention to its public services and the development which this post in the Near East demanded. Constantinople is economically bound to the regions to the north and east, and restrictions on relations with these producing districts have had a serious effect on the capital. The London Conference gave promise of the essential reconciliation of Anatolia and Constantinople.

Mr. Metz stated:

«From a commercial point of view present conditions in Constantinople present a more or less complete analogy to other parts of the world, possibly in somewhat aggravated form, due to the complete exhaustion or inaccessibility of its chief outlets. Losses incurred by the trading community have been very severe, but failures of importance have, in comparison with other markets, been few in number, mainly due to the assist-

ance rendered perforce by the banks. As a result, however, the local banking position is strained.

«Recovery can reasonably be expected only when the political horizon clears, world conditions generally improve and the natural markets, both of supply and of consumption, are again accessible to the merchants of Constantinople. When this is achieved it seems inevitable that Constantinople will again occupy its former position as the distributing and banking center of the Near East».

Foreign Trade Convention of the United States

The following letter sent to the Department of State, Washington, D. C., outlines the purpose and plans of the National Foreign Trade Council in its Eighth Annual Meeting in May, at Cleveland, Ohio.

Department of State Washington, D. C.

Gentlemen:

I should like to outline briefly our arrangements for the Eighth National Foreign Trade Convention to be held in Cleveland, Ohio May 4-5-6-7, 1921.

We have decided this year to return to our previous procedure and not to invite foreign chambers of commerce or commercial organizations to send accredited representatives. It has never been our policy to invite official representation on the part of foreign governments. National Foreign Trade Council will welcome the attendance of American foreign traders living and doing business abroad, of foreign business men who may be in the United States at the time of the Convention, and of delegations from American Chambers of Commerce in foreign countries.

The annual National Foreign Trade Conventions held under the auspices

Maisons à : NEW-YORK SMYRNE of the National Foreign Trade Council, are primarily gatherings of representatives of all phases of the international commerce of the United States, from all parts of the world, for the discussion and consideration by business men of the problems arising out of their daily transactions. These Conventions give special attention to the study of foreign markets in which sales of American produce may be extended and from which may be obtained products essential to industry in the United States. It is, therefore, reciprocally to the advantage of the producers and distributors in foreign markets, as well as those of the United States, to meet at such a Convention for the mutual interchange of views and information regarding market conditions, production, trade customs and regulations, and all matters affecting the free and profitable flow of commerce between them.

The San Francisco Convention of May, 1920, was attended by over 2400 business men. The location of the 1921 Convention in the heart of a great manufacturing center will undoubtedly result in an increased attendance and in an increased mutual understanding of the problems effecting both producer and distributor. The Convention will probably center around "American Foreign Trade and its Effect on Foreign Exchange.

Dr. E. E. Pratt has been elected delegate by the American Chamber of Commerce for the Levant to attend the National Foreign Trade Convention.

Guaranty Trust Company Dividend

At a Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Guaranty Trust Com-

pany of New York held in New York on March 2nd, the regular quarterly dividend of 5% on the capital stock for quarter ending March 31st was declared payable on that date to stock holders of record of March 18th.

On March 14th the Guaranty Trust Company opened an additional office in London at 29, Kingsway, London, W. C. 2. The office will be equipped to carry on a general banking business.

Admiral Bristol Returns from Mediterranean Gruise

Admiral Bristol returned on March 29th on the U. S. S. St. Louis, after a month's tour of the eastern Mediterranean on a visit to the officials attached to the United States High Commission.

The Admiral's cruise started in with the port of Smyrna, ran down to Alexandria, Egypt, and then followed up the coast of Palestine and Syria, taking in Jaffa, Haifa, Beirut, Alexandretta, and Mersina, with a call at Rhodes on the return. Points inland were visited from the ports.

The High Commissioner made note of American commercial activity in the region visited, and found an encouraging amount of American shipping. However, he comes back more than ever convinced that American business must not only explore and understand these regions that will yield profitable return to the right kind of business effort, but American business firms must establish themselves here in order to derive the greatest advantage from commercial enterprise.

Greek and Turkish Finances

(From " The Near East")

The report of the Corporation of Foreign Bondholders, which has just been issued, gives interesting data on the financial positions of Greece and Turkey. The following are extracts from the report:

Greece.

The total gross receipts in 1919 applicable to the service of the old gold loans amounted to 100,844,958 drachmæ against 67,450,699 drachmæ in 1918. The receipts from the monopolies and the stamp and tobacco duties, from which the plus values are derived, were 50,468,063 drachmæ and 36,264,901 drachmæ respectively an increase of 12,203,162 drachmæ, or 39 per cent. above the highest previous figure. Including balances from the previous years, the net amount available for increase of interest and sinking fund in 1920 was 20,792,020 francs, against 9,111,172 francs, in the previous year, and out of this sum, as stated in the Council's last report, the interest on all the loans of the three groups was raised to the full original rate and the ordinary sinking funds of the three groups were increased by 30, 30, and 32 per cent, of the original interest respectively.

In 1920 the gross receipts were 123,662,706 drachmæ, and the proportion applicable to the plus values was 65,630,414 drachmæ. The sum available for increase of interest and sinking fund will permit of the payment, for the second year in succession, of the full interest on all the old gold loans, and of additions of 28, 28 and 26 per cent, of the original interest respectively to the three groups. It is difficult to say anything at the present time as to the financial condition and outlook in Greece, the

future being so largely dependent on decisions of high policy. Recent political events, coupled with the withdrawal of financial support by the Allied Powers and the issue of a large amount of paper money without Parliamentary sanction or a corresponding gold reserve, have caused a very considerable fall in the value of the drachma.

Turkey

In 1918-19 the gross receipts from the revenues assigned to the service of the Unified Debt amounted to £T. 6,830,304 (paper), as against £T6,087,-495 (paper) in 1917-18. For 1919-20 the provisional receipts were £T7,735-, 630 (paper). No complete estimate of the receipts for the current year canbe made, as all communications with Anatolia have been interrupted for some time past. The agencies of the Debt Administration are allowed to continue in office, but the proceeds of the revenues have been taken by the Nationalist Government, which gives the agencies a receipt therefor. When and how these forced contributions, for which the Turkish Government will be ultimately held responsible, will be returned is, of course, most uncertain.

It may, however, be of interest to mention that up to the end of November, 1920, the gross yield from the ceded revenues (exclusive of Anatolia) was about £T2,450,000 (paper), while interest on deposits and on the reserve fund, and the Debt Council's share in the profits of the Tobacco Régie, were expected to bring the total up to about £T3,850,000 (paper). In addition to this the receipts from Adrianople, Broussa, and Smyrna were reckoned at about £T1,160,000 (paper).

The arrears of interest on the Unified Debt, reckoned up to March, 1921, amount to £6,876,234, against which the Debt Councils hold re-

The coupons due September, 1920, and March, 1921, amount to £1,324,695, but no definite information can be given at present as to the funds available to meet this additional charge. During the past year the edict of the Turkish Government forbidding the payment of coupons to subjects of enemy countries has been revoked. Payment of Unified coupons can now be obtained in Turkish currency, but it is not thought likely that many holders will avail themselves of the privilege.

The Council is informed that, with the consent of the respective Governments, provisional authority has been given by the acting Allied Commissioners at Constantinople to put into force the suspended tax on spirits, and that this should add considerably to the receipts of the

Debt Administration. As regards the funds deposited in German banks during the war by the German Austrian, and Turkish delegates on the Debt Council, it was decided, early in 1921, by the present Debt Council to call in on deposit the eleven coupons on the Unified Debt due March, 1915, to March, 1920. inclusive, with the object of establishing with the Allied clearing houses the claim of the bondholders to the repayment of the money at pre-war rates. A payment on account at the rate of is. 3d. per coupon of 8 shillings was offered to bondholders depositing their coupons. Receipts reserving their rights were given in place of the coupons so deposited. As the funds in question (amounting to some 160,000,000 marks) represent money collected by the Debt Council as agents for the bondholders for the service of the debt, it seems to the Council that the bondholders have

the strongest possible claim that the money should be repaid at the prewar rate and not in the present depreciated currency of Germany.

American Tobacco Exports.

When Sir Walter Raleigh startled his Elizabethan friends by blowing large puffs of smoke from tobacco brought from Virginia, he started a big American export business. The startled servant who threw a bucket of water in Sir Walter's face, under the impression that the courtly gentleman was on fire, tried to put a damper on this business. But the exporting of American tobacco has been thriving ever since.

The tobacco growers of the United States produced, during the year 1919, a crop valued at \$542,547,000. In the same year, exports of tobacco from this country were valued at \$259,438,843. In 1918, the production was \$402,264,000 and the exports \$122,599,767. The figures are for unmanufactured tobacco.

The 1919 figures are greater than the 1918 ones in both cases, indicating a natural, healthy growth in the industry. And it is especially significant that the 1919 figures for export are larger in proportion to the amount produced than those of

the previous year. There seems to be no question but that American tobacco is being consumed in larger quantities throughout the world.

Having reached this high point of production, the producers of tobacco naturally do not wish to recede from it. To do so would mean that production must be cut down, with the inevitable accompaniment of unemployment and uncertainty throughout the trade. The only way to maintain the production at its high point is to find foreign markets for the surplus that cannot be absorbed in this country.

Export Record for American Corn Syrup.

Corn syrup, distinctively an American product, bounded forward as a sugar substitute during the sugar famine of the last year with 255,617,700 pounds sent out. This amount according to the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, shows an increase of 346 per cent in quantity and 338 per cent in value over 1918 exports.

The output of this by product in 1921 probably will exceed all previous years, owing to the record corn crop, and corn syrup will become a factor in the country's export trade.

Palestine Development Company Organised in America.

Formation of a \$5,000,000 corporation, the American Palestine Company, to promote commerce and industry in Palestine was announced recently at a dinner attended by about 250 Jewish business men interested in the project for the immediate development of Palestine by American methods. Louis Marshall presided at the dinner, which was held in New York City.

Dr. S. Benderly, managing direc-

tor of the company, who recently returned from an extended survey of industrial and commercial conditions in Palestine, in outlining the plans of the company, said:

"There are a number of industries in Palestine, but they are hardly above the primitive stage. They lack both the mechanical and financial facilities of the modern industrial center. Under Turkish rule, capital was afraid to enter Palestine. Now with an era of safety, stability and progress inaugurated by Sir Herbert Samuel, British High Commissioner, governing under the mandate granted Great Britain at the San Remo Conference, conditions have changed.

"Existing industries in Palestine need capital and modern business organization. The American Palestine Company will supply these needs by building modern factory lofts, installing central power plants, pur-

Rumania Field of Rich Resources

(From the New York
"Journal of Commerce")

With greatly augmented territory and with natural resources of inestimable value awaiting exploitation and development Rumania to-day, while potentially one of the richest countries in Europe, needs money and credit to help its people to economic rehabilitation. Aristide Blank, director of the Banca Marmorosch, Blank & Co., one of the largest banks in Eastern Europe, and who is now in the United States establishing branches of his institution in New York and other American cities as a means of leveling the economic barriers which have heretofore held Rumania and the United States apart, speaking on conditions in his country said: "I have no hesitancy in saving that Rumania is potentially the richest country in Europe. Her resources in minerals, oils, forests and other products of the soil are beyond computation.

"Agriculturally Roumania is the granary of Europe, and under normal conditions is capable not only of supplying her own needs in foodstuffs but has enough surplus left as a result of her annual harvests to absorb all of the country's indebtedness incurred by participation in the war, But for lack of foreign money and necessary mach nery with which to take her products from the ground our progress toward economic independence is being retarded.

"I say retarded, because we in Rumania have no doubts of our ability to work out our own problems successfully and unaided if need be, but without financial assistance, [either through a loan to the Government or through credits over a long term, the process will naturally be prolonged Obviously, however, the rapidity with which Rumania and other world nations, burdened by the indebtedness incurred through participation in the war and the resultant dislocation of world exchanges, can be placed on their own economic legs, so much the sooner will the progress toward commercial readjustment be advanced.

"Perhaps one of Rumania's greatest advantages is the fact that her people are accustomed to work and are working now to better their conditions in the face of great obstacles. With money to aid them in their efforts to make available the country's great resources much would be accomplished toward the stabilization of international conditions.

"Naturally, in common with practically every other world nation, Rumania looks towards the United States for the necessary assistance. We need today more than anything else cotton, railway supplies and machinery of all kinds to equip and develop our mines and implements to equip our farms. The United States has all these things in abundance. By supplying Rumania's needs in raw materials and machinery and by extending the necessary credit over a period, say of from five to six years, to enable us to pay for them through our own productive efforts, the United States would be taking a long step toward a readjustment of world conditions.

"That the bankers and business men of the United States understand and appreciate the urgent necessity for long credits if their own and the world's best interests are to be served and the United States placed in an impregnable position in regard to her own future markets, is evidenced by the recent organization in Chicago of the Foreign Trade Finance Corporation. This organization once operating will go a long way towards solving

"Assuming that the United States would be willing to extend to Rumania the necessary money or credits there is no doubt of Rumania's ability to pay. Her indebtedness to-day is perhaps more amply secured than that of any European nation. The average grain crop produced in one normal year in excess of our own domestic needs more than equals in value the whole of Rumania's foreign debt. The average yearly yield exceeds 11,000,000 tons of grain. Approximately 5,000,000 tons are consumed at home. Thus 6,000,000 tons are available for export. But, unfortunately, for the present we lack the necessary funds to put our resources to work at their full capacity. In 1920 many products would have left for foreign ports, but factories have been forced to remain idle owing to lack of equipment and fields cannot be

tilled until implements and machinery can be supplied the peasants.

"This situation is principally due to the present low value of the lei, a temporary adverse condition, which could be overcome be furnishing machinery to peasants and agricultural co-operatives. And beyond the agricultural resources of the country are its other natural riches—oils and minerals. No one can estimate exactly the potential value of our oil resources. The most conservative estimate places the potential value of Rumanian oil fields at more than three hundred billion leis.

"All these riches are only important if they can be made available to the uses of industry and commerce.

"Further, we have no so-called working class in Rumania. Of our entire population of 17,000,000 people approximately 15,000,000 are peasants who live on farms. Our laboring class numbers less than 200,000 peo-

Mediterranean Mail Starts Levant Service April 14



AMERICA'S MERCHANT MARINE

By Winthrop L. MARVIN

(From "The Old Colony Magazine")

The report of the Commissioner of Navigation of the Department of Commerce, recently issued, shows that American merchant vessels last year earried 42.7 percent. of our imports and exports as compared with 9.7 percent, in the fiscal year 1914. This is a record of positive achievement which the great war made possible, but a close examination of the correlative data shows - and a truly hopeful sign it is-that the United States is not yet over-steamered. On June 30 last, the report shows we had a total registered shipping tonnage of 9,928,595 gross tons for foreign trade, which, during normal conditions of trade control and production, would serve to carry about 60 percent, in value of the foreign trade of the United-States.

We have not yet reached that 60 percent. Having only attained less than 43 percent., we nevertheless have a good right to the 60 percent. We ought to carry in our own ships 50 percent, of the commerce between Great Britain and the United States, 50 percent. of the commerce between France and the United States, 50 percent. of the commerce between Italy and the United States-and so on. These countries have a considerable tonnage of their own, and if we carry one-half, and they carry one-half, the division is perfectly fair and just. And there is another aspect of this division of trade as regards our ships. There are countries with which we are trading on an increasing scale, and whose patronage awaits our efforts in an abounding measure, which have inconsiderable merchant fleets of their own. The Asiatic mainland,

South America, Africa – all are our stakes in the struggle for maritime eminence. We ought to carry far more than half, or even than 60 percent. of our trade with them. That was, indeed, the condition prior to 1861, when we carried in our own ships, under our own flag, 65 percent. of our entire commerce.

It is true that today some of our Government-owned and private-owned ships are idle, but this does not mean that we have too many ships for our reasonable needs. What it really means is that foreign nations are carrying more than a rightful proportion of our commerce. United States certainly is honestly entitled to, and should have, a merchant shipping registered for overseas voyages of more than the present ten million tons. We have not built too many ships; we cannot spare any of the ships we have, except a part of the smaller steel craft and emergency wooden steamers.

The immediate future of the disposition and control of the bulk of this great fleet is bound up in the United States Shipping Board. The Jones law provides that the Board shall be appointed from every geographical section of the nation, thus putting into one official compass representatives of the interests of the whole country. Two must be from the Atlantic Seaboard States, two from the Pacific Coast States, one fcom the Great Lakes region, one from the Gulf States, and one from the interior States. It is understood that the new President will constitute of the new Board a body unbound by partisanship, and composed of men who are in the closest contact with the interests of our shipping and our foreign trade. ling to assume the responsibilities and arduous efforts which go with Shipping Board membership, it is fair to assume they will be in line for appointment.

Strengthening of its actual personnel will be the first step only, however, in solving the Government's side of our shipping problem. Technical assistants of the highest caliber are required, and they should receive adequate compensation to enable them to devote their services to this cause. Those best conversant with our maritime needs have spared no effort to impress the incoming administration with this necessity.

As with the outlook of men to guide our maritime policies, so with the physical aspects of our shipping, actual and prospective, there is much cause for encouragement. About a million and a half tons of new shipping is now in course of construction in the American yards, and it is

nearly all of post-war production and the expression of post war needs. Thus the oft-repeated criticism that our fleet was not "well-balanced." and needed "rounding-out," is being rapidly met with true Ameri an enterprise. This would have seemed a huge undertaking before the war. As a matter of fact it is only about half the tonnage which was building in our yards exactly a year ago. The Shipping Board programme, save for about 250,000 tons, has been completed, and the present reaction, which has been variously interpreted as a slump or the natural effect of commercial conditions, is not restricted to the United States. The shipbuilding activities of all the maritime nations have undergone curtailment.

The best factor to be seen in the present situation is that the next few months should bring about an improvement Section 23 of the new Merchant Marine act exempts Amer-

ican shipowners in the overseas trade from excess profits taxes, on condition that twice the amount of the exemption in private capital be joined to the exempted capital in the production of new tonnage. Thus the more fortunate of the American steamship companies will be ordering new ships soon, and these will have to be of American construction. Furthermore, another clause of the new law provides that the Shipping Board may set aside \$25,000,000 for new liner building, and the creation of liberal mail subsidies ought soon to take practical effect for the stimulation of building of a superior type of American ship. So, therefore, there is much cause for courage and confidence on the part of our shipbuilding companies. The present of course is a period of trial, but there is new and important work ahead. Nearly all the new converted transports and former German passenger ships have been assigned to particular services. Any further extensions of our shipping, such as provided by the new law, will mean a renewal of highclass building by American yards. For such a great Navy as we have and is at present projected there will be required an adequate complement of Naval reserve vessels.

The country is well fortified, too, against a recurrence of the economic mistakes which were inevitable in

our hasty building and emergency operation programme. Their rectification will take time, but it is already under way.

American yards are bidding for private account at a rate of around \$110 a deadweight ton for the same type of ships as are now operated by the Government's Emergency Fleet Corporation, and the sentiment is persistent and strong that if we are to maintain our present maritime position, to say nothing of establishing a guaranty for its future, we must write down the valuation so that the ships will be released from Federal ownership and be placed in competent private hand.

One of the results of recent official inquiries into the Government method of shipping operation has been a demand for a reform in the methods of chartering our ships to private operators and managers. The method termed the "bareboat charter" is most in favor-in fact, it is supported by all the established factors in our shipping. The "bareboat charter" provides, simply stated, that the ship be operated by private interests which assume the full responsibility for her maintenance, provisioning, fueling, management and operation. The plan has been sponsored by the American Steamship Owners' Association, and is only one of many steps which this association

has taken to foster and insure the continued success of shipping under our flag. It will soon eliminate the so-called temporary operator, who risks nothing and gains a commission. It will permit development of trade routes without the the discoloration of statements by red figures.

Just as the economic aspect of our shipping has changed since the war, so the protection which should be vouchsafed by our legislation has taken on a new aspect. There is now pressing in Washington, and supported by legislators and interests of both parties, an agitation for the elimination of the eighteenth amendment restrictions on our ships at sea.

The higher wages paid on American ships have made the seaman's calling attractive to an energetic and desirable personnel which has aided materially in manning our fleet, but economy of operation, and a surplus of seamen in all our ports, has shown renewed attention to the impossibility of further burdening our shipping with increasing costs of operation and management.

Marine insurance has become more and more American during the past Legislative encouragefew years. ment for it is needed and is on the point of being extended. Many of the drawbacks to the growth of marine insurance by American companies and syndicates will soon be removed if pending legislation becomes law, and few will begrudge the underwriters, whose efforts are indispensable to a maintained Merchant Shipping. more adequate legislative protection than they now receive. Abroad, there are few if any restrictions on marine underwriting.

With the duration of the inevitable period of deflation, it was only natural that American shipping would not escape some of its effect. That the outlook is today so promising for the capable American companies is the best evidence of the stability of the United States as a maritime nation, of the well-grounded basis on which our shipping today now rests. and of hope for the future in which American citizenship will rightly take pride and receive the benefits in an abounding measure.

Bulgarian Quarries

Although small, Bulgaria has been endowed by nature with various riches, among which the first place is occupied by mines, quarries, and mineral springs. Almost in every township there are found quarries which would bring a profitable return on development. Some of these quarries are of very great importance, but, on account of the lack of capital and the initiative to develop them, they have been very little worked. However, certain among them have been put into operation and have yielded splendid materials, especially for construction purposes. Such material comes from the districts of the villages of the Pirgos, Tulak, Opanetz, Bukov-Lak, &c.

The materials may be listed as follows:

A. Construction materials.

1.- Sandy limestone at Pirgos, district of Pirgos. These quarries extend for 15 kilometres along the Danube, and the layers are 10 meters in thickness. It is estimated that 200,000 cubic meters could be taken out annually.

2. Limestone. Quarries are both communal and private. They are tound in the district of Vratza, where they extend along the railroad track Mesdra -- Varna and Mesdra --Vratza. The stones are in white and soft blocks with a thickness of from ten to fifteen meters. The stone has various uses and is easily cut to the required shape. The annual production amounts to about 50,

000 cubic metres.

3.— Quarries of limestone, both communal and private are also found near the village of Choumen. For a long time they have been able to furnish work to an industry of considerable size.

4.— Quarries near the station of Sheitandjik along the railroad track Rousseh-Varna, which belong to the state, and from which are obtained excellent materials for stone crushers

The extremely favorable situation of this quarry greatly facilitates its exploitation, and makes it an attractive proposition for foreign capital.

- B. Quarries of material for cement and lime.
 - 1.— Quarries, both communal and private, near Radomir.
 - 2.- Private quarries near Belovo.
 - 3.— Communal and private quarries in the district of Preslav. Certain concessions near the village of Kruchovo have been examined by French engineers and chemists, who have declared that the quarries will yield cement equal to the best in Europe.
- C. Quarries of potter's earth.
 - 1.— There are mines of kaolin near the village of Torlak, Veinichteh, and Ussul-Keuy. It is anticipated that the products of these quarries will be of large importance in the economic life of Bulgaria.
 - 2.— The communal and private quarries of fire clay near the villages of Opanetz, Bukov-Lak, and Tchurukovo are also of great importance.
- D. Gypsum quarries.

The layers of gypsum near 'the villages of Radnevo and Iassen in the Department of Stara-Zagora and especially along the shore of the Black Sea between Bourgas and Varna are well known.

E. Ochre.

This is found in large quantities in the village of Slatevkovo near Kazanlik, and in quality rivals that of the west.

- F. Marble Quarries.
 - Those of Berkovitza are wellknown for their vari-colored veins.
 - 2. Those of Buzludje, of Stanimaka and the Rhodopes are very extensive and yield a stone that rivals the marble of Italy.

In addition there are other construction materials such as granite, cyanite, andesite, and porphyry in abundance in the Rila, the Rhodopes, Sredna-Gora and the Balkans. At present they are but feebly exploited but promise a valuable return for the future.

Despite the presence of such rich mines of construction material Bulgaria is still forced to import cement, lime and even potter's earth.

At this time when Bulgaria is on the threshold of a period of great construction projects, it is imperative that sufficient attention and funds be accorded these resources.

WHEAT AND FLOUR PRODUCTION IN THE UNITED STATES

One hundred and fifty years ago a peck of wheat was a fair yearly allowance of that article of food for a family in the United States; to-day each person consumes, on an average, between five and six bushels of wheat each year. The new agriculture has helped largely to this new standard of living, for the production of wheat has been made much cheaper and easier by mechanical inventions.

Eighteenth century wheat was cut with the sickle; then came the cradle, and in 1851 the reaper; later, the harvester, and finally combined harvester and thresher. The latter machine can be used only when very dry summers, such as occur in the Columbia River basin and the great valley of California, permit the grain to dry out on the stalk, so that shocking it up to cure it is not necessary. Here the combined harvester and thresher, driven by tractor or other power, sweeps over the great fields and daily puts into sacks the thoroughly dry grain of thirty acres or more of waving wheat fields. Likewise, with the introduction of machines the method of planting has been exceedingly improved since the days of the Biblical sower.

There are eight types of wheat Common Wheat, Club Wheat, Durum, Spelz, Emmer, Einkorn, Polish, and Poulard. Common wheat is divided into two great classes known as winter wheat and spring wheat. Winter wheat is sown in the fall and harvested late the following spring or in the early summer. Spring wheat is sown in the spring and harvested the same year, about a month or six weeks later than winter wheat. Fully seventy percent of the entire wheat crop grown in the United Stated is winter wheat.

Wheat has a double requirement of a cool, moist formative period and a warm ripening period. In the United States, for various reasons the wheat regions have shifted southwestward into Kansas, Oklahama and Texas, into a less frosty climate for winter wheat, and also northward into the colder Red River Valley of the north, where the rigors of the winter climate have no direct effect upon the wheat because it is spring sown.

Commercially wheats are classified into hard, semihard and soft, and macaroni types. The hard wheats are from the subhumid regions and are especially valuable for bread making purposes.

The soft wheats are the plump, starchy wheats from the humid regions, and make a flour especially desirable for pastries, crackers, and biscuits, but less desirable for making loaves of bread.

The United States is divided into wheat belts or districts according to the kinds of wheat grown. The most important wheat belt follows the line of about 20 inches of rainfall. The spring-wheat district of North Dakota, South Dakota and Minnesota is of great importance. This district comprises the coldest wheat growing area of the United States. Besides other types the durum wheat is also produced in this district. The introduction of this drought- and rust-resisting variety has resulted in the extension of the wheat area into the drier lands of the desert edge, which before were practically useless. Durum contains much more gluten and is thus very valuable for the manufacture of macaroni. Even before the war more than 50,000,000 bushels of Durum were grown in the United States.

The hard-winter-wheat district borders the hard-spring-wheat district on the west, the south and southeast, the principal states included being Kansas, Nebraska, Montana, and portions of Oklahoma, Colorado and Iowa.



The area of semihard and soft winter wheat lies south and east of the latter district. Scarcity of rainfall in the summer months and the relatively high temperature in the hard wheat section produces a kernel very hard and high in protein. The opposite conditions which prevail in the soft wheat area produce a soft grain, high in starch and low in protein.


The wheat of the Pacific coast is very plump, starchy and soft. Club varieties of wheat are common here. Wheat in the intermountain district is nearly all produced by dry farming.

In the Atlantic coast district the production is small compared with the total for the United States. It differs from the semi-hard-winter-wheat district, since the high precipitation produces wheat that is softer.

Despite the leadership of the central wheat districts of the United States, their yield is less per acre than that of the North Atlantic States, and far less than it is in northwest Europe. But on the lands of the west the yield per man is much greater than on the more laboriously tilled fields of Europe.

The wheat exporters of the United States grow their surplus for export in the heart of the continent a thousand miles or more from the seaports. But the excellence of transportation conditions have made it possible and profitable to bring the wheat to ocean harbors for export. In 1825 the Erie Canal connected the Hudson River with the Great Lakes and made possible boat transportation from the shores of the Great Lakes to New York at a fraction of the previous cost. Then the railroads spread their network out into the wheat growing areas, and the wheat has gone eastward to the sea in millions of bushels, being gathered together in the great markets, first at Chicago, and later at St. Louis, Kansas City, Milwaukee, and Duluth. From Kansas southward, the Gulf is nearer than the Atlantic and much wheat reaches the ocean steamer at New Orleans and Galveston.

Another mechanical invention has increased wheat-growing and its consumption, and has influenced the speed of settlement in the region north of Minneapolis. The wheat that grows there is so hard and brittle that the husk broke up when ground by the old-fashioned mill stones and the flour was dark and undesirable. The introduction of the rolling mill in the 19th century with the gradual reduction of the wheat by repeated pressing between steel

rollers gave a fine white flour, and spring wheat took the leadership in the market.

Minneapolis is the greatest flour milling city in America. It is situated at the gateway to the spring wheat plains that reach more than a thousand miles to the north west. During the busy season it is quite common so see a thousand carloads of wheat arrive at Minneapolis daily. Power for its mills is furnished by the falls of St. Anthony on the upper Mississipi. There are many mills here with a producing capacity of several thousand sacks of flour per day, and three with a capacity of 25,000 sacks; the Washburn-Crosby Company takes the lead with 50,000 sacks.

Formerly the time element in transportation from Minneapolis to New York was a serious handicap to the export of flour, as the greater amount of flour was sold mill shipment, and even today those mills which are far from the sea board find this an obstacle to best service. Some years ago several of the western companies conceived the idea of special mills for export service nearer the Atlantic coast. Among others, the Washburn-Crosby Company also constructed another mill at Buffalo, New York, to facilitate the exportation of its flour to European, Mediterranean and South



American ports. The wheat used in milling the Washburn-Crosby flour comes mainly from the northwest; the Dakotas, Minnesota and Nebraska are the chief sources. The wheat used in the export mill is shipped by means of the Great Lakes and by rail direct to the mill at Buffalo. Buffalo is an ideal city for a mill location as all the large trunk lines pass through this city. Shipments can be made to the sea board in record time, where by means of lighters the flour is transported to steamers. The Washburn-Crosby Company is especially equipped for this export business. The tremendous capacity of the mills insures continuous available stocks which are kept moving continuously to New York, where they are warehoused awaiting completion of sales. The uniformity in grade gives this flour unquestioned reliability. The first quality, "Gold Medal", is already well-known in the Levant Market, and gives the standard of high grade white flour in the market, while the other grades of Washburn-Crosby have secured distinct approval.

With the closing of the large grain areas of Russia and Anatolia, American flour has had a greater introduction in the Near East than ever before. With the fall of prices in the States the better grade flour has become almost a staple especially in Constantinople. The quality and price (r pound loaf, 3.5 cents) recommends the use of the best bread. Normal times will make some modification in the popular use, but a first-class, reliable article in flour will always have its demand here in the Levant.

Orange-Box Industry Jaffa Palestine

(From consular report)

Orange boxes are made in Jerusalem of lumber usually imported from Rumania and Austria, but recently Norwegian and Swedish lumber has been used. Some of this material comes sawed to the sizes required, and some is sawed at Jaffa. The dimensions of the sawed boxes are as follows: Length, 68 centimeters (26.77 inches); width, 32 centimeters (12.59 inches); height, 27 centimeters (10.62 inches). One partition is used.

The thickness of the ends and partition is 16 millimeters (0.65 inch); thickness of the sides, 8 millimeters (0.314 inch); thickness of tops and bottoms, 7 millimeters (0.27 inch). The box itself weighs about 4½ kilos (10 pounds) and its contents about 33 kilos (72.75 pounds).

Since the armistice the price of lumber has declined, and still great r reductions are expected, which restricts purchases to immediate requirements. The orange season in Palestine lasts from November to March, and contracts for lumber are made in the summer for delivery in August and September.

Undeveloped Markets for American Goods in Persia and Mesopotamia

The representative of an American company, who has been traveling for some 20 months in Persia for his firm, has forwarded the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce of the Department of Commerce, at Washington, D. C., the following observations relative to conditions and needs of Persia and Mesopotamia:

Ispahan, one of the principal cities of Persia, is situated halfway between Shiraz and Teheran and 300 miles from either, on the edge of a wide plain 5,600 feet above sea level. Its inhabitants are estimated at 100,000, with a rural population of over 150,000, who depend on that city for all their mercantile needs. A road suitable for carriages connects this city with both Teheran and Shiraz, a stage service being maintained. The average time to cover 300 miles of road is generally six days. Ispahan depends on camel and mule transportation to carry its commerce to the ports of Bushire and Ahwaz.

The imperial Bank of Pesria has a branch and does all the important banking. There are many sarrafs, or local bankers, some of whom deal with Bombay. There is a British consul, a Russian consular agent, and a newly

arrived French consular agent.

Ispahan carpets are considered among the best Persian makes. Cotton handprinted curtains (block printed in Ispahan on imported sheeting) find their way to foreign markets. Copper utensils are made for local consumption; silver and brass fancy articles are still made, but the prices asked for them forbid their export.

Imported articles consist of cottons of English, Indian, and Japanese manufacture. Next in importance are sugar and tea. All imported articles are of the cheapest varieties, a fact that accounts for many Japanese-made articles.

American-made goods are very rare. I believe some of our denims and cheap ghinghams ought to find a market in Ispahan. The better kind of sheetings, unbleached, could be introduced to advantage. If the right kind of shoe for men and women were introduced, it would monopolize the market. Unfortunately some very poor qualities of shoes have found their way to Persia through export adventurers. Table and hanging lamps of all varieties, looking glasses, window glass, silver-plated spoons, forks, and knives, fancy and colored table, plain, and cut glass, china dishes, chairs, bedsteads, storm lanterns, candles, solid-rubber tires for carriages, rubber overshoes, and sewing machines are in daily demand.

Mohammerah, Seaport for Ispahan.

Mohammerah, situated at the mouth of the Karun River, is the port for Ispahan and all the country lying between. It has a branch of the Imperial bank of Persia and a cable office. The British India Line, the Arab Line, and the Persian Line connect there with Bombay, and the Strick Line connects with London via Aden.

The Karun River enjoys the distinc-

tion of being the only navigable river in Persia. Up to Ahwaz, a distance of 110 miles, steamers of light draft make regular weekly sailings. They are side and stern wheelers, with a draft of less than 2 feet, and tow steel barges. Beyond the rapids at Ahwaz smaller steamers navigate the upper Karun to Shushter; from Shushter to Dizful native dhows make the trip.

The route to Ahwaz lies through a desert. In this part of Persia there is

no lack of fuel, because the refineries of the Anglo-Persian Oil Co. are located a few miles south of Mohammerah. Oil can also be obtained at Ahwaz from the same company. With proper pumping stations for water and with scientific handling of the soil there is reason to believe that excellent results could be obtained in cotton, dates, and all products of southern climes. I have had many inquiries in this region about American pumps, motor cars, and machinery, but the would-be purchasers prefer to see them working and thoroughly tested first.

Commercial Importance of Basra, Mesopotamia.

Basra, the only seaport of Mesopotamia, has a population of 25,000 to 30,000 and handles the commerce of all the country as far north as the town of Mosul and the mountains of Armenia. Since the British occupation it

has greatly prospered, and the high prices that dates have brought abroad helped in the prosperty. The British Government has constructed modern piers along several miles of water front with electric cranes and a light railway to facilitate loading and unloading.

I believe there is a wide field for American-made machinery and many kinds of cloth, if manufacturers will furnish these markets the kind of goods desired.

upward tendency been sustained, the annual figures would have been of staggering proportions. The latter half of the year, however, witnessed a veritable slump, and although the totals for the year are the largest ever recorded, those for the month of December show very heavy declines, both in imports and exports.

According to official figures compiled for the Fur Trade Review by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, the imports of raw furs for the calendar year 1920 gained 22 per cent over 1919, while receipts from manufactured furs showed the same percentage increase. The total exports for the calendar year rose 40 per cent, the greater part of the increase being due to the larger shipments of raw skins.

The imports of raw furs for December, 1920, declined no less than 82 per cent, as compared with the same month a year ago, while imports of manufactured furs for December show a loss of 65 per cent. Exports for the month recorded a shrinkage of 65 per cent, which was substantially greater than the decline noted for November.

Statistics for December, 1920

Imports.—The total value of furs and fur skins, undressed, imported in December, 1920, was \$1,611,931, as compared with \$8,176,593 for the same month of 1919. The decline in values

was substantially on a par with the reduction in the number of skins imported.

Canada again appears as the leading country of origin of raw furs imported in December, 1920, recording a total of \$465,274, as compared with \$2,199,050 for the same month a year ago. The United Kingdom occupied second place, with a total of \$272,659, as compared with \$710,341 for December, 1919. Australia stood third with \$194,861, as compared with \$2,211,240 in December, 1919, while China was a very close fourth with \$194,678, as compared with \$242,515. The statistics of imports of raw furs show the following additional changes from December, 1919, to the same mouth of 1920: France, from \$154,615 to \$80,959; Argentina, from \$710,341 to \$60,206; Japan, from \$335,807 to \$107, 303; Russia in Asia, from \$378,-428 to \$8,718; New Zealand, from \$293,098 to \$7,357; other countries, from \$349,135 to \$219,916. Considerable quantities of furs imported from Russia in Europe through indirect channels were undoubtedly included in "other countries" in December of both years.

The total imports of dressed and manufactured furs are now shown under three distinct headings, namely: furs dressed on the skin; hats, bonnets and hoods; and "all other furs". In December, 1920, dressed

furs aggregated \$73,324; hats, bonnets and hoods, \$34,420; and all other furs, \$244,574; total, \$352,318, as compared with \$1,809,721 in December, 1919.

Countries from which furs dressed on the skin were imported are not given under the new system of re-

cording these statistics.

Exports. The total value of furs and fur skins exported in December, 1920, was \$704,716, as compared with \$2,002,187 for the corresponding month of 1919. The official statistics as modified at the beginning of the last fiscal year show separately the imports of raw furs and manufactures. Shipments of raw furs in December, 1920, were as follows: to France, \$147,371; the United Kingdom, \$164,-886; Canada, \$36,812; other countries, \$ 141,896; total, \$ 490,955. Dressed furs and manufactures thereof were exported as follows: to Denmark, \$3,400; France, \$75,676; the United Kingdom, \$50,606; Canada, \$34,958; Argentina, \$3,995; other countries, \$45,116; total, \$213,751.

Statistics for the Calendar Year 1920

Imports.—The total imports of furs and fur skins undressed during the calendar year 1920 were valued at \$84,427,592, as compared with \$69,-289,909 in 1919 and \$32,158,939 in 1918. While the gain in value for the calendar year 1920 amounted to 22 per cent, there was a substantial decline in the number of skins imported.

As has been noted for many months the United Kingdom and its dependencies have furnished the bulk of the skins imported during the past year, the British Dominions supplying more than half the importations. Statistical changes in the value of imports recorded for the calendar years 1919 and 1920, respectively, were as follows: France, from \$2,992,158 to \$3,397,965; Russia in Eu-

rope, from \$376,254 to \$211,156; the United Kingdom, from \$13,055,688 to \$16,933,679; Canada, from \$16,378,378 to \$13,096,720; Argentina, from \$3,813.756 to \$2,099,874; China, from \$5,114,129 to \$10,566,781; Japan, from \$5,465,061 to \$5,307,387; Russia in Asia, from \$4,001,784 to \$4,553,471; Australia, from \$12,153,472 to \$12,196,461; New Zealand, from \$1,541,455 to \$2,313,823; other countries, from \$4,-

387,744 to \$13,750,475.

Imports of dressed furs and manufactures of all kinds for the calendar year 1920 aggregated \$9,131,348, as compared with \$7,472,336 for the corresponding period of 1919. The total for the calendar year 1920, therefore, showed a gain of 22 per cent over 1919, which largely exceeded the imports of 1918. Imports for the calendar year 1920 were made up las follows: furs dressed on the skin, \$3,960,977; hats, bonnets and hoods, \$1,159,492; all other furs, \$4,010,879.

and manufactures thereof for the calendar year 1920 were valued at \$32,886,995, as compared with \$23,-788,599 in 1919 and \$11,374,174 in 1918. Thus the total for the calendar year 1920 closely approximated the combined total of 1919 and 1918. The export figures were divided into manufactured and unmanufactured furs. Exportations of unmanufactured furs were as follows: to France, \$3,545,474; the United Kingdom, \$13,-807,582; Canada, \$6,188,406; other countries, \$2,731,845; total, \$26,273,307. Exports of manufactured furs were as follows: to Denmark, \$66,982; France, \$2,944,529; Norway, \$68; United Kingdom, \$1,145,739; Canada, \$1,257,964; Argentina, \$472,292; other countries, \$726,414; total \$6,613,688.

The Peanut Industry in Egypt

(Consul Lester Maynard, Alexandria).

Peanuts in Egypt are cultivated on sandy land which is not suitable for the cultivation of other crops. The crop is sown in May, which is considered the beginning of the peanut season. During the 1915-16 season a little over 11,000 acres were sown. The area was increased to over 13-000 the next season and was followed by a season of approximately 14,000 acres. In 1918-19 the area sown was almost 15.000 acres and in 1919-20 approximately the same area was under cultivation.

The yield varies greatly according to the locality, kind of nuts grown, and the attending soil and climatic condition. The average yield per acre is about 2,000 pounds.

According to the above the average annual yield of nuts would be about

30,000,000 pounds during the two latest years given, and although this is not a very large quantity it is nevertheless very profitable to grow these nuts in Egypt, as the land used, being sandy, is not suitable for the cultivation of cotton or other valuable crops and the cost of growing the nuts is comparatively low. Under present labor conditions the growing of groundnuts on otherwise useless soils yields from 50 to 100 per cent profit on the actual cost of cultivation and harvesting, but not allowing for the cost of the land.

There are three varieties of peanuts cultivated in Egypt. The Sudani, a small compact nut varying in color of shell in accordance with the soil in which it is planted, but is generally pale buff or gray brown, is cultivated to a greater extent than the other varieties and enters mainly into the export trade. The pods usually contain two nuts, rarely three or one. The variety which brings the highest price is the Hindi introduced from southern India. These nuts are larger than the first variety and are mostly found with three kernels. The El-Huri, a nut of European origin, is a large two-celled nut, which is not grown so often in Egypt. Since peanuts have been introduced into Egypt from almost all parts of the world, the varieties have become so mixed that it is difficult to recognize them. The only variety which has clearly maintained its main characteristic is the Sudani. In October, 1920, the Sudani was valued at 32 Egyptian pounds per metric ton on the Alexandria market. The Indian variety was valued at 38 Egyptian pounds per metric ton.

Imports, Exports, and Home Consumption

During 1918 and 1919 the exports of peanuts from Egypt amounted to

over 2,300,000 pounds and 5,700,000 pounds, valued at \$192,237 and \$549,257, respectively. Palestine was the heaviest purchaser, taking in 1918, 1,667,868 pounds, valued at \$137,309, and in 1919, 3,044,322 pounds, valued at \$297,402. Tripoli, in 1918, took 436,674 pounds, valued at \$31,588, and in 1919, 958,335 pounds, valued at \$81,665. Other countries participating in the exports were Syria, Arabia, British Mediterranean possessions, Greece, Rhodes, the Sudan, and Turkey.

According to the figures previously given, the average yield of peanuts in Egypt is about 30,000,000 pounds per annum. Considering only the export figures for the year 1919 (almost 6,000,000 pounds), approximately 24,000,000 pounds of the Egyptian crop would be left for home consumption. But to this must be added the imports from India, China and the Sudan, which in 1919 amounted to over 7,900,000 pounds, so that the total home consumption would be approximately 32,000,000 pounds. Due to the unusual conditions effecting food crops, however, comparisons between recent years make it difficult to arrive at an accurate annual normal consumption.

Peanuts are used in the Near East in confectionery, but are principally consumed salted and roasted. Almost the whole crop which is consumed locally is used in this manner, a very small proportion being crushed for oil.

There is no indication of an increase in the production of peanuts in Egypt, as other crops are more profitable, and land which can not be used for the more favored crops and which can be used for peanuts is limited, as Egypt must depend upon irrigation for the watering of crops, and the irrigation canals do not extend into the sandy regions.

There are no modern peanut-oil

The amount thus produced is negligible, and none enters into the export trade, although a considerable quantity of peanut oil is imported from abroad. Labor saving machinery, or other similar devices are not used in the production of peanuts, and no special machines are used for pressing oil.

American Credit Men Urge Support of Federal Commerce Bureau

The national committee on foreign credits of the National Association of Credit Men met recently in New York City to consider means of emphasizing to the administration the importance of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce in order to secure for it more adequate provisions for effective service. The Bureau has been threatened with a curtailment of appropriations which, it was declared, would be of serious detriment not only to the Department but to the economic life of the country on the side of foreign trade.

Communications were sent to President Harding and other prominent members of Congress urging that liberal appropriations be made in the future towards maintaining the activities of the Bureau. It was stated that fifteen million persons in America are entirely dependent on foreign trade for their living; and that the money expended to build one torpedo boat alone would well cover the expenses of the Government in the successful establishment and maintenance of our commercial relations with other countries.

L. R. Browne, chairman of the Committee, wrote:

"Too much can hardly be said of

the results already accomplished nor is it possible to exaggerate the opportunities for service which will come to the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce with the progress of time. It is astonishing that with the limited funds at its command the bureau has been able to accomplish what has already been done by it. Its help is sought and appreciated in many quarters. It is perhaps true that the keen appreciation with which the results of the work of that bureau has been received has not been voiced as adequately as possible.

"The foreign commerce of the United States totals vast sums of money every year and in a large measure the maintenance and growth of the export portion of that trade depends upon an efficient personnel in the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce. It seems logical therefore to conclude that adequate provision



should be made for a department on which so much depends and it is with the idea of insuring through the medium of yourself and other members of Congress that this letter is addressed to you and in the hope that the high regard in which the bureau and its work is held by the business community of the country as a whole, will be borne in mind when considering future appropriations; that the bureau may be more adequately provided for; that it may be able to extend its present activities and retain in its personnel at salaries more nearly adequate, men who have shown their ability during a long service and add to its strength by attracting to its service the most capable men."

Guaranty Trust Staff Annual Dinner

The staff of the Guaranty Trust Company in each of the various branch offices over the world as well as in the central office in New York city is organized into a good fellowship chapter. Simultaneously in their respective cities the chapters hold an annual dinner and entertainment. The custom has not only promoted stronger sympathy among the members of the chapter in each center, but has helped to link up all the chapters of the institution in friendly feeling and cooperation.

The annual dinner of 1921 was held on April 2d. The Constantinople Chapter had prepared its banquet at Pera Palace, and over one hundred members of the Chapter with the officers of the bank enjoyed the dinner together.

Mr. A. W. Cartwright, Vice President of the Chapter, presided at the dinner. In the after-dinner speeches by Mr. Cartwright and by Mr. J. Wesley Conn and Mr. Peter

Solari, the latter the Joint Managers of the Constantinople bank, cooperation was the theme. Cooperation was declared the basis of the institutions development, and a key to its success and the organization of the chapters might be pointed to both as effect and cause of cooperation. The good will among the personnel, officers and staff, had long been evidenced in intimate contact and understanding, while the motto of "Room at the Top" might well express the confidence which the Guaranty Trust Company administration manifested in its personnel.

Two telegrams from distant chapters were read at the dinner and gave a vivid sense of the wide extent of the brotherhood.

The entertainment following the dinner was largely «home talent», at its best. Two opera arias by the Russian singer, Mme. Valovatch, were a special favor.

With dinner, concert and dance the night was none too long, the large company enjoying every bit of entertainment.

The Constantinople Chapter of the Guaranty Trust Company has brought to our business institutions here a new idea in staff cooperation and fellowship. Its composition is doubtless more cosmopolitan than is found in the chapters elsewhere, but unity is not more clearly marked.

New Industries in Yugo-Slavia

Belgrade.— During the last few months there has been much industrial activity in Yugo-Slavia. A considerable number of factories have been started or reopened, and their number is to be added to in the near future. An oil manufacturing factory is being built in Belgrade, and chemical works in the neighborhood of that

city. The woolen fabrics mills of Teokarevitch, Illitch and Petrovitch in Leskowatz are being rebuilt and will soon commence work. A cardboard factory, which will be the largest in the country, is being built at Ossiek in Slavonia, fitted with up-to-date machinery. Two other new establishments in the same place, one for the manufacture of chemicals and the other for that of household articles, have commenced activities. The firm of Gjoukitch is building a furniture factory in Brod. The Prometna bank in Vissoko, in Bosnia, has founded a tannery. The hydro-electric power works at Zelina-Vir, in Croatia, are finished and will shortly commence operations. The power works recently commenced at Sminj, in Dalmatia, for exploiting the power obtained from the Cettina River falls, which is expected to generate 30,000 horse power, will soon be finished.

Market for Agricultural Machinery in Palestine

(Consul OSCAR S. HEIZER, Jerusalem)

Although little has been done as yet to improve upon the agricultural implements used heretofore in Palestine, now with the change of Government and the increase in the value of crops a dispositions is being shown to improve agricultural methods and to introduce intensive cultivation. The country is not well suited to the use of heavy implements and machinery, owing to its hilly and rocky character throughout the larger part of its area. Therefore strong, but light and simple, plows to be drawn by small donkeys and cattle are best adapted to this market. The plain region, extending parallel with the coast, is about 25 miles wide and is almost flat. This, as well as the very fertile flat land south of Hebron,

around Beersheba, and the country east of the Jordan River, could advantageously use the most modern type of agricultural machinery. The German and Jewish farmers who settled on the plains parallel with the coast have been using more modern plows, and a few harrows, reapers, and binders. Some attempts have been made with various kinds of tractors. An agricultural show is to be held about the early spring of 1921, which is expected to determine which kind and make of tractor is best suited for this district. A small tractor is needed for plowing the orchards and almond plantations, the owners of which are now experiencing considerable difficulty in having these dug up or plowed, owing to the scarcity and high cost of manual labor. Such a tractor should be strong and so compact as to be not more than 3 feet high by 3 feet wide. . If such a motor could be constructed.

Best Methods of Making Sales.


As the people have yet to be educated up to the use of tractors and other complicated machinery, the only possible system of promoting a sale would be the consignment to a reliable local firm, with authority to lease a tractor to a prospective buyer for a few weeks' trial, on condition that, should it prove successful, it would be purchased at a prearranged price. Another method would be to send out a mechanic with a machine to demonstrate its actual working to the farmers. Attractive colored illustrated advertising would second such efforts, and in due course of time a reasonable increase in sales should be expected. It would be a loss of time to rely entirely on correspondence and literature for the sale of agricultural machinery. The lack of repair shops has stood, as a serious obstacle in the way of the importation of machinery, but this condition is being gradually remedied, and before long adequate service in the way of repairs in all lines of machinery will be available.

mentation de plus de 78 millions de dollars, la circulation des Billets de Banque de la «Federal Reserve Bank» diminua de plus de 9 millions de dollars. En dépit de l'augmentation des dépôts de 34 millions de dollars, la proportion des réserves aux dépôts et aux engagements en Billets de banque de la "Federal Reserve Bank" combinés, augmenta de 45,8% à 50,3%, atteignant ainsi le pourcentage le plus haut depuis Juin 1919. Cette amélioration est significative por le fait que le nouveau système adopté récemment pour le calcul des proportions donne des résultats moins favorables et aussi parceque la "Federal Reserve Bank" de New York était restée en arrière de l'amélioration générale de la position des réserves du système, et a supporté le plus dur du poids incident à la tension du crédit. La circulation des Billets de banque de tout le système des "Federal Reserve Banks" diminua la semaine dernière de 32 millions de dollars, portant à 474 millions de dollars, la réduction depuis le haut chiffre de Décembre passé. Les importations de Février furent de 215 millions de dollars, chiffre légèrement supérieur à celui de Janvier, qui fut le plus bas chiffre mensuel des deux dernières années Le fléchissement des prix contribué aux chargements moins importants.

Ainsi, la récolte de 1920 dépassa de plus d'un million de balles toutes les récoltes depuis 1914.

TOBACCO FACTORY AT SOFIA, BULGARIA.

On March 29th the tobacco factory, "Enidjeh", was inaugurated at Sofia. The occasion was marked by a religious ceremony after the custom of the country, and a banquet later with addresses by some of the prominent government officials and business men.

The proprietors of the factory are Messrs. Zlateff. The building of this factory marks a new step of progress for Bulgarian industry. Up to the present Bulgarian tobacco has come on the international market under Egyptian, Turkish or other labels, and Bulgarian tobacco has been exploited without corresponding benefit to the country. Exportation is the chief aim of the new factory; the industrialization of a product of Bulgarian agriculture is expected to bring large profit both to the firm and the country.

After the inaugural ceremonies, the machines in the factory were started. With an eight-hour work day the factory can turn out 3,000,000 cigarettes per day. With double

This amount exceeds the production of four or five of the old establishments and will be sufficient for local consumption. The factory will make cigarettes of various qualities. On April 1st the factory placed its first products in the local market.

The factory building itself is large and modern; the machines are of the newest make. The factory is under Mr. D. Mossinoff as manager, with Mr. Trendaphiloff as assistant manager. The latter has been employed in some of the largest factories in Egypt, Germany, and Belgium.

The "Enidjeh" is expected to bring to Bulgarian tobacco the popularity which it deserves as Bulgarian tobacco, and to achieve in this industry what the factory of "Thrace" at "Stara-Zagora" has achieved in Bulgarian wines.

The Emery of Naxos

It is expected that the emery production of the island of Naxos for 1921 will amount to about 11,268 tons.

Last year's output of the emery mines of the island was 11,000 tons. The government paid to the proprietors of the mines 1,077,468 drachmæ. The following table shows the quantity of emery exported from the island during 1920.

There were about 9,206,000 kilos of emery stored in the warehouses of Syros and the gulf of Naxos on January 1st.

During the month of January total exports amounted to 700,750 kilos, out of which 502,750 were exported to America.

In February 279,550 kilos were exported via Syros. 220,000 kilos have been shipped to Manchester, and 200,000 to Liverpool since the first of the year.

Constantinople Market

The continuance of hostilities in the interior of Anatolia has had a still further reaction on such traffic as had persisted through the previous quiescent period. The Greek occupation of Afion Karahissar for a time cut off Angora from Adalia, port on the south coast of Asia Minor in the so-called Italian concession.

Sheeting, as an article of prime necessity, remains an item of export from Constantinople as distributing center to Rumania and Bulgaria.

P. C. Hale, vice president of the Bank of Italy at San Francisco, U. S. America, was in Constantinople the first week in April surveying the field for the interest of certain American capital. Commander Bryan, U. S. N., son of Mr. Hale. is attached to the High Commission at Constantinople.

J. Touché, representing Hamilton, Brown & Co., shoe manufacturers at St. Louis, U. S. America, is in the city to introduce to our market his firm's well and favorably-known make of American shoes. S. Arnopolin, of the Simmons Company, bed manufacturers at Kenosha, U. S. America, is now touring the eastern Mediterranean district in the interests of his firm.

Dr. H. H. Powers, president of the Bureau of University Travel, Boston, U. S. America, accompanied by Mrs. Powers, arrived at Constantinople on the 17th with a party of twenty American tourists, nearing the end of a world tour. This is the first considerable party of world tourists that has reached the Near East since the war, and they have found obstacles to travel multiplied here, though they were able to make the trip up through Syria comfortably. Greece follows next in their tour. Before the war the Bureau made a specialty of the Aegean lands with the aid of its yacht "Athena". Under excellent leadership the Bureau still maintains the highest standard fin compensating travel. Its summer school and various other parties will reach the Levant later in the season.

Lewis Heck, manager for the Levant of the General Motors Export Company, left on the 18th for an extended tour of businesss survey in the Balkan peninsula.

Shelby Saunders, formerly Captain, U. S. Army, and adjutant of Colonel Haskell, Interallied High Commissioner to Armenia, is now establishing business relations in the Near East on his own account, besides representing the New Orleans Chamber of Commerce. He is at present active in Rumania and assisting the American consul in the country, Mr. Felix Cole, in establishing in Bucharest a Rumanian Section of the American Chamber of Commerce for the Levant.
