

# GENERAL STATEMENTS

ANATOLIA College was founded in Marsovan Turkey in 1886, incorporated under the laws of Massachusetts, U. S. A., in 1894, and was recognized by Imperial Turkish Firman in 1899. The school was closed in March, 1921 and remained closed until January 1924, when it was reopened in Salonica, Greece. In January 1925 the Greek Minestry of Education recognized the institution as entitled to continue in Greece with all former rights and privileges, and the Superintendent of Higher Education for Macedonia publicly presented the Permits on February 2, 1925.

At a meeting of the Trustes in Boston, May 26, 1925, it was voted: «to transfer permanently Anatolia College from Turkey to Greece; and to locate the College in the vicinity of Salonica».

Arrangements have been made for the purchase of the Casino, that we have been renting, as «Tracy Hall», in honor of President Charles Chapin Tracy; also for the purchase of a rambling building called «Iowa Quadrangle», nearly cornering with the large athletic field which is attached to Tracy Hall. This property will furnish the basis for a good and growing day school with a temporary boarding department in the busy metropolis. Meantime the permanent location for the College proper and the boarding department on the hills back of the city, involving questions of health, water supply, and the like, is under careful consideration.

For two and a half years in a new city, a new country, and a new continent, the Pilgrim College has been passing through a transition period. The curriculum is now in process of revision in order to approximate the Greek and European «Gymnasium», with thorough work in English in addition. Instruction in English is stressed in the lower classes, and English is the language of instruction in the upper classes. The whole course, then, approximates the six years of an American Junior College. For the year 1926—1927 there will be no

Sixth Form, or Sophomore, class; and one Sub-Form class will be provided, corresponding to the sixth grade of the common schools.

# ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Special acknowledgements are due to many friends and friendly organizations. General Pangalos, President of the Republic, has recently confirmed the welcome and the promise of friendly cooperation frequently expressed by other officials and by people generally. The Governor General of Macedonia, the Superintendent of Education, the Mayor of Salonica, and other officials including the clergy of the Orthodox Church and of other denominations, have taken a uniformly favoring attitude. Similarly, many Greeks in America have taken a keen interest in an American college enterprise in their native country. Full descriptive and commendatory articles have appeared in the "Atlantis,, , "National Herald,, and "American Hellenic World,, ; also in the "Gotchnag,, of New York, on behalf of many Armenian alumni. Among contributors special thanks are due to Mr. George Nicolas and to the Trustees of Konia Institute. About 500 volumes from the library of the late Professor Aris. tides Phoutrides of Harvard University have been given by his widow, Mrs. Margaret Garrison Phoutrides, in addition to some 2000 books already accessible to our Professor J. P. Xenides and Professor J. J. Manissadjian are active on behalf of the Co'lege in America.

# TERMS OF ADMISSION

Applicants for admission must be at least twelve years of age, and present a guarantee of character from some responsible person. Students holding certificates of admission to the First Class of the Gymnasium, or pass-

ing examinations to correspond, are classified in the First Form. Students advanced in the Gymnasium course are classified accordingly; if they have had no English, extra English lessons are provided until they bring up their arrears. English is not required for admission.

# INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS

The Boarding Department will open Monday noon, September 20, and will close on the day following Commencement. No students will be allowed to occupy the dormitories before or after these dates, except by special permission.

In addition to personal clothing and toilet articles boarding pupils should bring with them a single-bed mattress, pillow cases, blankets or quilts, towels and bath articles. It is desirable that heelless shoes and an athletic suit be brought for use in games and gymnastics.

Also a mosquito net.

In addition to the regular class work the College provides valuable and enjoyable opportunities for the development of leadership, initiative, and the ability to cooperate, in various "extra-curriculum" activities. The Anatolia Club, a student organization, holds meetings once a week in which the students have a chance to develop their ability in public speaking, in music, and in the presentation of simple plays and dialogues. A large athletic field, with adequate equipment, provides facilities for football, basketball, volleyball, baseball and tennis, as well as for track and field work, by arrangement of the Athletic Association under the direction of one member of the Faculty. During the year various interscholastic contests are arranged in conjunction with the Y. M. C. A. and other schools in the city.

On Sunday morning every student is encouraged to attend his own church service. In the afternoon there is a Vesper Service in English for boarding pupils, which is frequently attended by day pupils and friends from

outside who understand English.

#### EXPENSES

The charge for tuition for a day pupil is 40.00 dollars per year, payable in four installments of 10.00 dollars each. in drachmae at the rate of exchange current at the time payment is made. The charge for a boarding pupil is 160.00 dollars payable in two equal installments; one at the opening of the school, and the other immediately after the winter vacation.

At the time of registration a deposit of 200 drachmae is required of all day pupils and 500 drachmae from all boarders This amount is credited on the first payment. The Direction reserves the right to retain this deposit in case the student fails to enter school.

In addition to the charge for tuition and board which is paid to the College, students must pay the tax required by the Government.

Boarding pupils who remain at the school during the Christmas and Easter holidays will pay for their living at the rate of 12.00 dollars per month.

Each student provides his own books and clothing, but text books can be rented from the College at reasonable rates.
