



ORGANIZATION AND HISTORY

St. Paul's College, with a course of study covering five years, and St. Paul's Academy, with a four years' course, together form the Institute. The Academy was opened in the fall of 1888, only eight pupils being in attendance. The College graduated its first class in June 1893. That the School met a felt want in these regions is proved by the steadily increasing numbers of its students. Many more would come were there dormitories to receive them. The unquenchable hunger for Christian education in these Apostolic Lands is one of the best fruits of the Gospel, and a sure premise of its ultimate triumph.

FOUNDATION AND GROWTH

In the spring of 1885, the late Col. Elliott F. Shepard of New York City had a conference in Tarsus with the missionary of the American Board who at that time had charge of the work in the Cilician Plain. The past glories of the city and its neighborhood, and the demand now made by the young churches of Cilicia for higher education for their children were set before the visitor; and, like his ancestors at Boston in 1630, he "began to think upon a College." The result was seen when, in March 1887, he got a Bill passed through the Legislature of the State of New York organizing "St. Paul's Institute at Tarsus." Dr. Howard Crosby was the first President of the Board of Trustees. After his death Dr. H. M. MacCracken, Chancellor of New York University, was appointed President. In November 1903 the Institute, consisting of two Departments, was formally transferred to the American Board of Commissioners for foreign missions; and is now under the control of the Prudential Committee of that Board. Since the lamented death of our Founder in March 1893, his widow, Mrs. Elliot F. Shepard, and her son-in-law and daughter, Dr. and Mrs. William Jay Schieffelin, have generously assisted the School in many ways. In this good work they ask the co-operation of all friends of missions.

PURPOSE

St. Paul's Academy gives a good preparation for business life to young men who do not wish to take the full course in College, besides the work it does as a preparatory-school for those who do. St. Paul's College, as may be seen in its program of studies, aims to train men thoroughly in all the chief branches of Christian learning. In harmony with the express wish of our Founder, and the views and desires of all the teachers, the College has as its special object the preparation of men for entrance to the Theological Seminary at Marash, or the Medical Department of the Syrian Protestant College at Beirut, or the teacher's desk in the High Schools of the country.

LOCATION

Tarsus, on the river Cydnus, is eighteen miles from Mersine, the port of Cilicia, and is connected by rail with both Mersine and Adana. Last year, by the completion of the railway from the Taurus mountains to the Amanus mountains, the larger cities and towns of the Cilician plain were brought within easy access. Since the adoption of the Constitution in 1908 traveling has been unrestricted; the freedom granted to the press and the friendly attitude of the government toward our institutions have greatly increased the desire and the demand for higher education.

The buildings of the Institute are situated in the outskirts of the city, and command a fine view of the great Plain, and of the long line of the Taurus mountains. The Cilician Gates, the famous pass through the Taurus 30 miles away, brings the interior of Asia Minor into direct communication with Tarsus. This, and the fact that there is no other college of the American Board for young men within less than four day's journey, make the situation of Tarsus for a school like this especially favorable.

GENERAL STATEMENT

ADMISSION

Without special permission of the Faculty, no boy will be received as a boarder who is under fourteen years of age. Candidates for admission must bring a certificate of good moral character. Candidates for advanced standing must pass examinations in all the studies that have been pursued by the class they wish to enter.

Examinations for new students and for those conditioned the previous year are held on Monday and Tuesday preceding the opening of the school. Students must pay a special fee of one mejidie each for examinations given at any other than the appointed hours.

A student is required to study regularly with the class each subject in which he has not passed an entrance examination.

EXPENSES

The annual charges for students are :

Tuition in the College Department, three Turkish pounds (£ T. 3=\$13.20)

Tuition in the Academy Department, two Turkish pounds (£ T. 2=\$ 8.80)

BOARD including lights, fuel, service, and place in the dormitory, twelve Turkish pounds (£ T. 12 = \$52.80) Vacations are not included.

A limited number of students will be received to the President's and teacher's table. for which the price will be twenty three Turkish pounds (£. T. 23). This includes the use of a separate bedroom, but the student must bring all necessary fur nishings.

Payment of one-half the total bill is required at the beginning of each semester. Students will not be received to lessons or to the boarding department until their dues have been paid.

If a student leaves the College before the end of the year no part of his tuition will be returned to him. Of the amount which he has paid into the boarding department a sum proportionate to the remaining part of the school year, less one Turkish pound, will be refunded.

Boarders bring their own bedding, and arrange for their own washing. Books are rented at a reasonable rate to those unable to buy them.

No reduction in board or tuition is made to students who come late, except in cases of severe illness.

SPECIAL FEES

Entrance examinations given after the time assigned for them, one mejidie.

Special examinations, either for removing "conditions" or for obtaining advance credit in any subject, one mejidie each.

For courses involving laboratory work, a fee proportionate to the expenses.

For the College diploma, one half lira.

For the Academy diploma, one mejidie.

For expenses, such as damage to school property, loss of books, medicine, etc., one-half lira must be paid by each student on entrance. The portion not used is refunded at the end of the school year.

BENEFICIARIES AND INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENT

In accordance with our Founder's intention and the needs of the country, a limited number of promising boys are assisted in meeting their expenses. The greatest care is exercised in the selection of beneficiaries. The fund for this purpose, which is provided by special gifts from friends and societies, is not equal to the demands upon it.

Fifty dollars in the way of help, in addition to service required of him, will enable a young man to board and study here for a year. Attention is called to the following regulations:

1. Every student who himself pays less than the full charges is considered a beneficiary.

- 2. Beneficiaries are expected to do manual or other labor which the college may assign to them, to the equivalent of at least half the amount of the aid which they receive. The college holds the right to the full amount of work, whether in each individual case we may be able to make use of it or not.
- 3. No student is allowed to change his work, but must do that assigned. As the work is frequently changed by us this is fair to all.
- No student whose scholarship, conduct, or spirit in work is not good, will be received as a beneficiary the following year.
- 5. Beneficiaries must bring at the beginning of the first semester all the money that they are to pay for the year. If this sum exceeds eight liras, however, the balance above eight liras may be paid at the beginning of the second sen ester.

SEMESTERS AND VACATIONS

The school-year is divided into semesters, the second semester beginning after the Christmas Holidays. Two vacations are given, at the Oriental Christmas and Easter.

LANGUAGES

Thorough instruction is given in four languages, English, French, Turkish and Armenian. In the College Department, as far as possible, the language of instruction and conversation is English.

HEALTH

The Institute is situated just outside the city, swept by fresh breezes from sea and mountain. There is a good supply of water on the premises, brought in iron pipes from the Cydnus.

Gymnastic exercise is compulsory. A Field day is held once a year, when prizes are given for excellence in gymnastics and athletics. The health of the students is good. It is a cause for thankfulness that since the School was opened, in 1888, only six students have died in term-time.

RELIGIOUS EXERCISES

Each day's work is opened and closed with prayer, singing, and reading of the Scriptures. Regular lessons in the Bible are given to each class every morning after prayers. The weekly prayer-meeting is held on Tuesday evening. On the Lord's day there is a Sabbath-school in the morning, a preaching service in the courch in the afternoon, and prayer-meeting or song-service in the evening. The Y. M. C. A. holds a meeting every Friday evening.

Besides these services, there are frequent religious addresses

given by the President and others.

The Y. M. C. A. of the Institute is a strong society, whose influence for good is felt throughout the School. It owns the beginning of a library, to which the members will be glad to receive additions in the way of books in various languages.

Many students show a steady growth in Christian character

and identify themselves with the work of the churches.

Music

Instruction in singing by note is a regular part of the curriculum. Those who wish are taught for a small fee to play on various instruments. The orchestra of about fifteen pieces is conducted by one of the teachers, and plays selections on public occasions. The instruments owned by the school have been paid for by concerts given from time to time. We believe with Milton that the influence of good music is essential in the higher training of young men.

LITERARY WORK AND DECLAMATIONS


Debates are held occasionally on Saturday evenings. Declamations in English, French, Turkish, and Armenian are given every Saturday forenoon during the year. The twelve students who have averaged highest in these compete in a prize-speaking contest on Commencement Day. One of Shakespere's plays is sometimes presented in May.


BUILDINGS

- 1. Through the kindness of Mrs. Elliott F. Shepard, the main building and three acres were bought for the Institute in 1895. In this building, the missionary family live, and twenty-five students sleep. It contains, also, the college school-room, dining-room, and kitchen, used for over 160 students and teachers, and the library.
- 2. Marash Hall, a small building lightly constructed of wood and plaster, contains the Academy school-room, the printing press, a dormitory for fifteen boys, and four smaller rooms.
- 3. Brewer Hall is a still smaller building similarly constructed. It provides for the Y. M. C. A. room, bookbinding department, the college book-room, two recitation-rooms, and accommodations for the servants.
- 4. The new Stickler Hall, a large stone building of four stories, is still unfinished. The first floor gives us a good chapel, the second contains eight recitation-rooms, the third, now used as a dormitory is designed ultimately for a museum and recitation rooms. A dormitory for 50 boys is on the top floor. The basement, when furnished, will make a good gymnasium.
- 5. The Chemistry building is a one-room stone structure, used for all the Natural Sciences.
- 6, A small, stone Bath-house, with cold water shower baths and wash-room, was erected this year.

NEEDS

- 1. The Institute needs most urgently 8 9.000 to finish and furnish the new Stickler Hall.
- 2. An adjacent lot containing two acres should be added to our campus, thus giving us five acres in all. This can be purchased for about \$ 1,800.
- 3. To provide for new teachers' salaries. 50,000 dollars should be added to the endowment.
- 4. We are urgently in need of a laboratory equipment for teaching the Natural Sciences.

- 5. A thorough refurnishing of the school dining-room and kitchen is very desirable.
- 6. The massacres have made more urgent the demands for aid to promising students. Additions to our fund for this purpose are greatly needed.
 - 7. The Academy needs new desks for 140 boys.

PRIZES

Prizes are offered each year for excellence in Handwriting, Gymnastics, Athletics, Declamations, Scholarship, and Essays in College newspapers, and also the following:—

- 1. Alumni prize. Open to Juniors and Seniors. Subject of essay, "Methods of Municipal Reform in Turkey."
- 2. Dadourian Mathematics Prize. Open to Juniors and Seniors. Examination on Conic Sections.
- 3. Dadourian Armenian Prize Open to three upper classes. Subject of essay "The Origin of Poetry and its Effect in the Amelioration of Nations."
- 4. Brewer English Prize. Open to three upper classes. Subject of essay, "The Spirit and Work of David Livingstone as a Missionary."
- 5. Rejebian Chemistry Prize. Given for highest standing in Chemistry in the Junior year.
- 6. Highest Scholarship Prize. Open to Freshman and Sub-Freshman.
- 7. Mrs. Christie Botany Prize. For highest scholarship and best herbarium in Botany.
- 8. Baghdikian Science Prize. Open to three upper classes. Sub-Ject of essay, "The ten greatest Inventions or Discoveries of the Twentieth Century."
- French Prizes. For best compositions and highest scholarship in each of the three upper classes.

10. Literary Prize. Open to the College classes. Given in 1915 for best Essay in English, or for best translation into English of an assigned piece.

LIBRARY

A well-selected library of nearly four thousand volumes was presented to the Institute some years ago by the President and his wife. It is rich especially in aids to the study of the Bible, Church History, Theology, Secular History, and English Literature. Additions to it will be thankfully received. Our teachers and advanced students make great use of it.

Examination, Grade, Diploma

Two regular written examinations are held each year. The grade of a student depends on his average daily mark and his examination mark. The highest mark given is 100; the passing mark is 70. If a student falls below 70 in three lessons at the end of a semester, he must go back a year; the same result follows if within three months he does not remove by a second examination a condition imposed by a former-one.

Students who complete the College course in a satisfactory manner receive a degree of Bachelor of Arts. Certificates are given to boys who finish their course in the Academy.

DISCIPLINE

The discipline is that of a Christian home. The missionaries and several teachers live in the buildings with the boys, and take their meals with them. Thus constant oversight is exercised. Card playing, the use of tobacco and intoxicants, bad language, and all conduct prejudicial to good morals, are prohibited. Students are forbidden to keep weapons of any kind in their rooms. Every student is required to attend daily prayers, Bible classes, the church on the Sabbath and all religious exercises appointed by the school. The Lord's Day is observed in a Christian manner; visits, except in cases of sickness, are not made or received on that day. Young men who show little aptitude for study, or who evidently are not in harmony with the spirit of the School are not allowed to remain. Students and parents should remember that the Faculty retains the right to send a boy away at any time, for just cause. In such cases the money paid for tuition will not be refunded, and only the just proportion of that paid for board can be demanded from the Treasurer.
