

ORGANIZATION AND HISTORY

St. Paul's College and St. Paul's Academy, each with a course of study covering five years, together form the Institute. The Academy was opened in the fall of 1888, only eight pupils being in attendance. The College graduated its first class in June 1893. That the School met a felt want in these regions is proved by the steadily increasing numbers of its students. Many more would come were there dormitories to receive them. The unquenchable hunger for Christian education in these Apostolic Lands is one of the best fruits of the Gospel, and a sure promise of its ultimate triumph.

In the spring of 1885, the late Col. Elliott F. Shepard, of New York City, had a conference in Tarsus with the missionary of the American Board who at that time had charge of the work in the Cilician Plain. The past glories of the city and its neighborhood, and the demand now made by the young churches of Cilicia for higher education for their children were set before the visitor; and, like his ancestors at Boston in 1630, he "began to think upon a College." The result was seen when, in March 1887, he got a Bill passed through the Legislature of the State of New York organizing "St. Paul's Institute at Tarsus." Dr. Howard Crosby was the first President of the Board of Trustees. After his death Dr. Henry M. MacCracken, Chancellor of New York University, was appointed President. In November 1903 the Institute, consisting of its two Departments, was formally transferred to the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions; and is now under the control of the Prudential Committee of that Since the lamented death of our Founder, in March 1803, his widow, Mrs. Elliott F. Shepard, and her son-in-law and daughter, Dr. and Mrs. William Jay Schieffelin, have generously assisted the School in many ways. In this good work they ask the co-operation of all friends of missions. St. Paul's Academy gives a good preparation for business life to young men who do not wish to take the full course in College, besides the work it does as a preparatory-school for those who do. St. Paul's College, as may be seen in its program of studies, aims to train men thoroughly in all the chief branches of Christian learning. harmony with the express wish of our Founder, and the views and desires of all the teachers, the College has as its special object the preparation of men for entrance to the Theological Seminary at Marash, or the Medical Department of the Syrian Protestant College at Beirut, or the teacher's desk in the High Schools of the country.

Tarsus, on the river Cydnus, is eighteen miles from Mersine, the port of Cilicia, and is connected by rail with both Mersine and Adana. The buildings of the Institute are situated on high ground in the outskirts of the city, and command a fine view of the great Plain, and of the long line of the Taurus mountains. The Cicilian Gates, the famous Pass through the Taurus 30 miles away, brings the interior of Asia Minor into direct communication with Tarsus. This, and the fact that there is no other college of the American Board for young men within less than six days' journey, make the situation of Tarsus for a school like this especially favorable.

GENERAL STATEMENT

ADMISSION

Without special vote of the Faculty, no boy will be received as a boarder who is under fourteen years of age. Candidates for admission must bring certificates of their good moral character. Candidates for advanced standing must pass examinations in all the studies that have been pursued by the class they wish to enter.

EXPENSES

There are two tables, students' table and teachers' table, and expenses vary accordingly. Boys eating at the teachers' table pay seventeen Turkish pounds a year, exclusive of vacations, for board, tuition, light, and a place in the dormitory. Those eating at the common table pay ten Turkish pounds. Instrumental music is extra. Boys at the teachers' table must bring their own forks, spoons, napkins, and rings; and each boarder is required to furnish his own bedding, an umbrella, and towels. The students pay for their own washing. Books are rented at a reasonable rate to those unable to buy.

BENEFICIARIES AND INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENT

In accordance with our Founder's intention, and the needs of the country, a limited number of promising boys are assisted in meeting their expenses. The greatest care is exercised in the selection of beneficiaries. Our fund for this purpose is not equal to the demands upon it. Forty dollars in the way of help enables a young man to board and study here for a year. Attention is called to the following regulations:—

- I. The beneficiary aid will be given as a loan. The student will give his note, signed by some responsible person, for that part of his tuition which he is unable to pay. To pay this debt, the student will be required to do manual or other work which the College assigns him. His work will be estimated at its proper value and the amount subtracted from the note. At the end of the year this note will be cancelled and a new one made out for the balance due the School.
- 2. Unless the student's work is satisfactory, it will not be accepted in payment of the note.

- 3. Any student whose scholarship, conduct, or spirit in work is not good, will not be received as a beneficiary the following year.
- 4. No student will be allowed to change his work, but must do the work assigned. As the work is frequently changed, this is perfectly fair to all.

SEMESTERS AND VACATIONS

The shool-year in divided into semesters, the second semester beginning after the Christmas holidays. Two vacations are given, at the Oriental Christmas and Easter.

LANGUAGES

Thorough instruction is given in five languages, English, French, Turkish, Armenian and Greek; each student takes four of these, the Armenian and Greek being mutually exclusive. In the College Department, as far as possible, the language of instruction and conversation is English.

HEALTH

The Institute is situated on a fine slope just outside the city, swept by fresh breezes from sea and mountain. There is a good supply of fresh water on the premises, brought in iron pipes from the Cydnus.

Gymnastic exercise is compulsory. A Field-day is held once a year, when prizes are given for excellence in gymnastics and athletics. The health of the students is good. It is a cause for thankfulness that since the School was opened, in 1888, but one student has died here in term-time.

RELIGIOUS EXERCISES

Each day's work is opened with prayer, singing, and reading of the Scriptures; and closed in the afternoon with prayer and singing. Regular lessons in the Bible are given to each class every morning after prayers. The weekly prayer-meeting is held on Wednesday evening. On the Lord's Day there is Sabbath-school in the morning; a preaching service in the church in the afternoon; and a prayer-meeting in the evening, conducted by members of the Y.M.C.A. The School is frequently blessed with helpful revivals.

Besides these sevices, there are frequent religious addresses given by the President and others.

The Y.M.C.A. of the Institute is a strong society, whose influence for good is felt throughout the School. It owns the be-

ginnings of a good library, to which the members will be glad to receive additions in the way of books in various languages.

MUSIC

Instruction in singing by note is a regular part of the curriculum. Those who wish are taught for a small fee to play on various instruments. The orchestra of about twenty pieces is conducted by a competent teacher and plays excellent selections every weekday afternoon except Saturday. The instruments have been nearly paid for by concerts given from time to time. We believe with Milton that the influence of good music is essential in the higher training of young men.

LITERARY WORK AND DECLAMATIONS

Debates are held frequently on Saturday evenings. Declamations in English, French, Turkish, Armenian, and Greek, are given every Saturday forenoon during two terms of the year. One of Shakespere's plays is sometimes presented in May.

BUILDINGS

Through the kindness of Mrs. Elliott F. Shepard, the main building and three acres of land were bought for the Institute in 1895. In this building the missionaries live, and fifty students sleep. It contains also the college school-room, two recitation-rooms, a dining-room, and two kitchens. There are three smaller buildings used mainly as dormitories; under one of them is the academy school-room, and under another some very inadequate recitation-rooms.

The Institute needs most urgently a residence for the foreign teachers; a new dormitory; a bath-house; a sak-room; and an adjacent lot containing two acres, which will give us a campus of five acres in all.

LIBRARY

A well-selected library of about three thousand volumes was presented to the Institute some years ago by the President and his wife. It is rich especially in aids to the study of the Bible, Church History, Theology, Secular History, and English Literature. Additions to it will be thankfully received. Our teachers and advanced students make great use of it. A few good periodicals in five languages are taken and are eagerly read by the boys.

PRIZES

Prizes are offered each year for excellence in Gymnastics, Athletics, Declamations, and Essays for college newspapers. The following special prizes are offered:—

- 1. Alumni Prize. Open to Juniors and Seniors. Subject this year, "Benefits conferred by Science upon Commerce and Business." This essay to be handed in on May 15th.
- 2. Dadourian Mathematics Prize. Open to Juniors and Seniors. Subject this year, "Working of two hundred examples at the end of Plane Geometry and Conic Sections."
- 3. Dadourian Armenian Prize. Open to three upper classes. Subject this year, "The Character of Armenian Religious Poetry."
- 4. Torosian English Prize. Open to three upper classes. Subject this year, "Tennyson's in Memoriam; its Religious Conceptions."
- 5. Deer River English Prize. Open to the whole College. Subject this year, "Why am I a College Student?"
- 6. Baghdikian Chemistry Prize. Open to Juniors and Seniors. Subject this year, "Chemistry in Everyday Life."
 Essays 2-6 to be handed in on May 31st.

EXAMINATIONS, GRADE, DIPLOMA.

Three regular written examinations are held each year. The grade of a student depends on his average daily mark and his examination mark. The highest mark given is 100; the passing mark in 70. If a student falls below 70 in three lessons he must go back a year; the same result follows if within three months he does not remove by a second examination a condition imposed by a former one.

Students who complete the nine years' course in a satisfactory manner receive the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Certificates are given to boys who finish their course in the Academy.

DISCIPLINE.

The discipline is that of a Christian home. The missionaries and several teachers live in the buildings with the boys, and eat with them. Thus constant oversight is exercised. The use of tobacco and intoxicants, bad language, and conduct prejudicial to good morals are prohibited. It is expected that every student will behave as a Christian gentleman. The Lord's Day is observed in a Christian manner; visits, except in cases of sickness, are not made or received on that day. Young men who show little aptitude for study, or who evidently are not in harmony with the spirit of the School are not allowed to remain. Students and parents should remember that the Faculty retains the right to send a boy away at any time, for just cause. In such cases the money paid for tuition will not be refunded; and only the just proportion of that paid for board can be demanded from the Treasurer.
