

What Is the American Board?

The American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions is the oldest foreign missionary society in America. It was started at a meeting of an association of Congregational churches in 1810, in response to the urgency of some keen young college men eager to carry the Gospel to the heathen. Though it has always been closely related to the Congregational denomination, it has enlisted the service and support of members of many churches. In 1924–25 sixty-seven new missionaries were appointed for service under the Board, of whom thirty belong to churches other than Congregational. The American Board, with its affiliated Woman's Boards, maintains Christian work in seventeen mission fields throughout the world. Its yearly budget is more than \$2,000,000.

In 1819 the first missionaries to the Near East started out with instructions to see: "What good can be done? By what means? What can be done for Jews? What for pagans? What for Mohammedans? What for Christians?"

For over one hundred years the missionaries of the American Board have been following this program of doing good by all means to all the people. Schools, churches, hospitals and social and industrial centers have been maintained. The printing press has produced wholesome literature in English, Turkish, Armenian, Bulgarian, Greek and Kurdish. Daily contacts of helpfulness have been established in home and marketplace. Despite political upheavals and racial migrations the missionaries of the Near East have continued their ministry of free service to all.







In its half-million inhabitants are numbered some 40,000 Armenians, mostly refugees from Asia Minor.
