



#### COLLEGE DUES

The annual payment for each boarding pupil is fifteen (15) Turkish liras: for day pupils four (4) Turkish liras.

The above charges are devided as follows.

for Board nine Turkish liras

- " Tuition four "
- " Bath, light etc. two Turkish liras

#### TIME FOR PAYMENT

At the opening of school in Sept. each student will pay nine (9) liras the balance six (6) liras is due the first week in Feb. (New Style)

#### FINES

A fine of ten (10) piasters on each lira is inposed when payments are delayed. If the delayed payment is more than two weeks the fine is increased.

#### DEPOSITS

A deposit of one (1) medjidieh is required fron each student for the protection of school property. If students are careful not to abuse the property of the school, a part of the medjidieh may be returned at the end of the school year.

#### REBATES

Up to November 1, no discount is made to students who come late.

Students who leave college before the close of the year will forfeit their board money to the end of the month in which they depart, and tuition to the end of the semester.

In case a boarding pupil leaves school within one week after matriculating, a fee of one Turkish lira will be charged and one quarter of a Turkish lira for day pupils. After one week the regular rule for rebates will be applied.

#### EXAMINATIONS

Students who fail in their lessons and wish to take an extra examination must pay one (1) medjidie for the privelege.

#### LABORATORY FEES

A fee of 2 medjidies is charged to each student for the laboratory work in chemistry, a fee of one medjidie for the laboratory work in physics and a fee of 1 medjidie for the laboratory work in mineralogy. These fees are paid in advance at the beginning of each coruse.

# PRESIDENT'S MASSAGE TO THE CLASS OF 1912

If a being from the sublimer spheres of existence were suddenly to appear before you - an angel endowed with knowledge of this and other worldsif, fastening his deep eyes on you, he were to ask the searching question: What is your purpose in living? How would you answer him? Suppose you give any one of the common answers -- I intend to be a literary man-a scientist-a physician-a statesman-a traveler-I intend to make a fortunecould you look into those deep eyes and make such reply? Would it be any answer at all? All such things are, at best, only means to an end-what is the purpose? And what would you think of making that answer which many a young man makes to his own heart, and sometimes to his companions: I intend to have a good time?—that is, give myself to pleasure? You would hardly dare say that to a respectable man; how

If so questioned by such a being, I fear many of us would be struck dumb

could you say it to the angel?

-unable to answer at all. I fear many of us would be found as purposeless as a chip floating about on the water. On the contrary, how grand is the character of those who have lived for a purpose! They may be few in the multitude, but they differ as much from the purposeless as flying birds differ from falling leaves. I eo Tolstoi, oppressed with this question: What is the object of my existence?, walked in the forest barefooted, crying out in agony, determined to find the purpose of his life, or put an end to it found that purpose found the God of his life - found his service, and became mighty.

There was a boy of Galilee, only twelve years old who, at that early date knew and embraced the purpose of his life—from it he never swerved an hour. To do the will of the Father was his meat and his drink. He overcame the momentum of a world going wrong; he became Master of the Ages. The man with a single eye fixed upon the purpose approved of God, and ever conscious of that purpose, is akin to the Divine. Happy is he who has this consciousness, and can say to the angel: For this I live.

The College year closes on the Tuesday near the 24 th of June.


The Christmas vacation will extend from the 7th to the 20th of January incl.





#### COURSE OF STUDY.

The course of study covers eight years. During the first four years most of the work is carried on through the verna-During the last four years all work in Mathematics, History and Science is given in the English language The study of her own vernacular and of English is required of each student throughout her course. Lessons in plain sewing, dressmaking, embroidery and other forms of fine needle work, ironing and cooking form a part of the required work. All have training in chorus singing. French, Piano and Organ lessons are given to those who pay an additional fee for them.

#### TERMS OF ADMISSION.

For admission to the First Form the candidate must be able to read and write her own vernacular freely. She must be prepared to pass an examination in Arithmetic in Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Division. Satisfactory testimonials in regard to character are required before a pupil is received. For boarding pupils 12 years is the age limit.


To enter an advanced class the candidate is required to pass examination on the work of the class preceding the one to which she seeks admisssion.

Entrance examinations are held on the Monday and Tuesday preceding the opening of the first semester. It is important that application for admission be made early.



THE KING SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF.

The Martha A. King School for the Deaf was opened in 1910 as a department of Anatolia Girls' School. Pupils, both boys and girls, are received at from 6 to 8 years of age. While older pupils may in some cases be received it is important for the attainment of the best results that children enter when within the age limits stated. methods used are those which have been found most successful in training the deaf in America. Each pupil is taught through hisown vernacular reading, writing, speech and speech reading (from the lips). Much attention is given to developing the moral and social side of the child's nature. All are taught sewing and house-work. The boys have regular work in the Anatolia College Carpenter Shop.

The annual charge for boarding pupils is LTq. 12.00. Applications for admission should be made early.





# THE NEW

Anatolia Hospital is affiliated with Anatolia College. The Hospital Board of Managers are the President of the College, Principal of the Girls Seminary, the station Treasurer, and the American physician. The Hospital now draws patients from a verylarge area. Patients frequently come eight and ten days' journey to avail themselves of the advantages of the Hospital.

The following statistics will indicate the growth of the Hospital, and give some idea of the extent of the work.

In-patients (patients treated in the hospital) in 1897 - 34, in 1910 - 852.

Of the 852 in-patients, 610 were surgical; 242, medical. 367 Armenians; 279, Truks; 176, Greeks; 30 misc.

In 1910, number of new patients, seen in clinic, 3690. Number of operations 804.

The Hospital staff consists of two doctors, two foreign nurses, one qualified dispenser, two Armenian nurses, a nurses' training class, and a force of twenty-five servants and helpers.

The nurses' training class receives girls who have graduated from the Girls' Seminary, or who have received an equivalent course of training. In the Hospital they spend three years in practical and theoretical training. While the demand for trained nurses for private nursing among the people is yet in its infancy, we believe there will soon be a large opportunity for those who are prepared to do modern nursing.

The growth of the Hospital and College has made it imperative for the hospital to move out of the college compound.


The western half of the new site is level, but the eastern portion is on the slope of a narrow valley. The main building of the Hospital, named the Towle Memorial Building, is placed along the brow of the slope. From the windows of its wide east front there is splendid and uninterrupted view across the valley and stream, and the wheat fields, orchards, and vineyards of the Marsovan plain, to the lofty mountain range of Ak Dagh, only twenty miles away.

The main entrance and administration offices will be in the center of the Towle building. The male patients will occupy the southern portion of the ground floor, while the operating rooms and the native doctor's quarters, will occupy the northern end. On the floor above will be the female patients, and the small wards for private patients. On the top story will be quarters for the foreign nurses, supplementary wards, and rooms for native nurses.

A separate block for the dispensary will be built beside the entrance gate. The kitchen and laundry block will be west of the main building; its attic floor will have the dormitories for the female servants. Dormitories for the male servants are provided over the dispensary block.

This is as far as the scheme for the Hospital extends at present. There is however, great need for accommodation for the treatment of tubercular cases. It is hoped before long to provide an extension of the Hospital in which these cases may be placed. This building will be placed to the east of the Towle block, connected there-to by a low corridor.

It is intended to heat the building with hot water, and to provide electric light eventually.

The 10 para tax stamp which is affixed to the receipt given by the Post-office to the sender in registration of Domestic Mails is not necessary for registered mail sent to Foreign Conntries.

# GENERAL REGULATIONS RESPECTING FOREIGN MAILS

Unpaid letters received from the Postal Union are chargeable with 2 piastres per 20 grs. or fraction. Insufficiently prepaid correspondence of all kinds is chargeable with double the amount of deficient postage.

Matter to be sent in the mails at less than letter rates must be so wrapped that it can be readily examined at the office of delivery, as well as the mailing office, without destroying the wrappers.

Mail matter of all kinds received from any country of the Postal Union is required to be reforwarded, at the request of the addressee, from one postoffice to another, or to any Foreign Country embraced in the Postal Union without additional charge for postage.

## TARIFF FOR PARCEL POST TO FOREIGN COUNTRIES

Every parcel must have a Customs declaration respecting the contents. This must be on a form obtainable at any Post Office. The duties cannot be prepaid, but are collected on delivery. The maximum amount of declared value is 500 francs.

RULE L. When an appeal from the chair's decision results in a tie vote, the chair is sustained.

RULE M. Requires a two-thirds vote unless special rules have been enacted.

Rule N. Does not required to be seconded.

#### GENERAL RULES.

No motion is open for discussion un-

til it has been stated by the chair.

The maker of a motion cannot modify it or withdraw it after it has been stated by the chair, except by general consent.

Only one reconsideration of a question

is permitted.

A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table or to take from the table, cannot be renewed unless some other motion has intervened.

On motion to strike out the words "Shall the words stand part of the moion?" Unless a majority sustains, the words are struck out.

On motion for previous question, the form to be observed is, "Shall the main question be now put?" This if carried ends debate.

On an appeal from the chair, "Shall the decision be sustained as the ruling of the house?" The chair is generally sustained.

On motion for orders of the day, "will the house now proceed to the orders of the day?" This, if carried, supersedes intervening motions.

On objection raised to considering questions, "Shall the question be considered?" Objections may be made before debate has commenced, but not ubsequently.


